website." The increasing use of electronic messaging has also changed the way school officials make emergency announcements.

"We use the School Reach program, which is an information system that's Web-based," he said. "It consists of making a phone call to parents with a recording of my voice, or we can type in the message."

**NO MORE PAPER TRAIL**

The paperless trail has led to reduction, or even elimination, of a classroom staple — textbooks. Districts are teaching through electronic means, said Wynot teacher Chuck Tramp.

"(Students) have grown up with technology, and it has gotten to be second nature with them," he said. "Technology is absolutely imperative (in the classroom)."

At Wynot, each student maintains an e-learning account. The student submits essays and other assignments to the teacher's account. The teacher then grades the work and returns it to the student's account.

Heidi Klug, a Wynot senior, has taken distance learning all four years of high school.

"Half of my courses have been on-line or distance learning," she said. "I can take about everything electronically except (physical education)."

Wynot, Newcastle, Coleridge and Laurel-Concord students meet as a group with their teacher at the start of the course, Klug said. Wynot students also take courses from around the state.

Students use laptops to check videos and other lessons not possible the traditional paper way, Higgins said. In addition, the school operates six large screens connecting Wynot students with other schools.

Wynot received \$70,000 in incentive money from the state of Nebraska for participating in 35 long-distance classes, Higgins said.

And what about courses that require hands-on work, such as home economics, art or labs? A paraprofessional oversees the students in the room, and a courier transports assignments to Coleridge and Laurel.

The electronic learning requires discipline from students, Higgins said. "Here, you have low-maintenance high achievers who get their studies done," he said.

**LESS IS MORE**

Technology has produced savings of more than just paper. Electronic learning has allowed sharing of staff with other districts without shutting students, saving time, gas and the wear and tear on vehicles.

On Wednesday, Wynot seniors Bailey Kuchta, Shelby Wieseler and Jason Kruse were taking American history for college credit from Newcastle teacher Janice Sherman.

In the nearby chemistry lab, Nicole Snyder was teaching Wynot and Newcastle students. She alternates days between schools.

The paperless classroom begins in kindergarten, as Wynot and Newcastle use electronic learning to share a Spanish teacher for grades K-8.

By sharing staff, rural districts such as Wynot are saving on payroll, Higgins said. They also offer courses not otherwise possible, particularly with certified teachers difficult to find in certain classes.

What difference has the electronic classroom meant to Wynot? "The Nebraska Department of Education requires a minimum of 400 credits offered in your school," Higgins said. "We offered more than 420 credits in 2010, including distance learning, and the latest report I sent listed 555 credits available to our students. We added one-fourth to our curriculum."

The move away from traditional classrooms has meant more courses while reducing or eliminating paper for courses and gas for travel, Higgins said. In turn, it has meant greater sharing of classes such as agriculture, higher level math, marine biology, home economics, a full-scale art program and advanced Spanish courses.

"It's 100 percent going green, and it all ties together," he said.

**Spc. Jensen's Journey Home**

The South Dakota National Guard has released the route for today's (Thursday's) funeral procession of Spc. Dennis Jensen from Yankton to Sturgis.

Jensen, a Vermillion native, was killed in a non-combat accident in Afghanistan. His funeral will be held at 10 a.m. today at the United Church of Christ-Congregational in Yankton.

Jensen's procession leaves Yankton at 1:30 p.m., traveling U.S. Highway 81 to Madison and arriving at approximately 3:30 p.m. The procession then travels to DeSmet, arriving at 4:15 p.m.

The processional will travel Highway 14 through Pierre, arriving at 6:45 p.m. The final leg of the journey will travel Highway 34 to Sturgis, arriving at approximately 8:45 p.m. Mountain Daylight Time (MDT).

Jensen's interment will occur at 10 a.m. MDT Friday at the Black Hills National Cemetery near Sturgis.
