

USD Receives Grant To Aid Students In Service

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota was awarded close to a million dollars in scholarship support for students involved in service.

USD, the only public institution in the state to receive the award, will receive more than \$950,000 over three years from Colorado Campus Compact and the federal Corporation for National & Community Service (Corporation). The Center for Academic Engagement at USD will lead the effort.

USD students who receive these awards will become AmeriCorps members and focus on meeting critical community needs. Funding will assist students in their efforts to provide education support services in K-12 schools, deliver health care services in medically underserved communities to uninsured/underinsured individuals and assist local nonprofit organizations. During the life of the grant, close to 520 students will receive this scholarship opportunity joining a regional network of students serving through colleges and universities in Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota.

"The USD AmeriCorps program will reward students working in the highest need areas around the region," stated Chuck Staben, provost and vice president for academic affairs at USD. "It is also an excellent extension of the university's goal to partner with communities in addressing local challenges."

Flood Cleanup: How To Deal With Mold

PIERRE — As flood-affected homeowners begin the cleanup process, the Department of Health offers the following basic information about dealing with mold.

- Is mold a hazard after water damage? Molds can produce toxins. There is always a little mold everywhere — in the air and on many surfaces. However, when mold spores drop on places where there is excessive moisture, especially from flooding, they will attach themselves to many things and grow. Many building materials such as wallpaper, insulation, drywall, carpet, fabric, and others support mold growth.

- Who is most at risk in reacting to molds? People who have allergies or compromised immune systems are most at risk. Symptoms may include minor irritations such as nasal stuffiness or eye irritation but can also include severe reactions such as fever, shortness of breath or infections.

- How do I disinfect my home? Fully disinfecting a home after it is flooded is critical, particularly if small children will be crawling on or touching affected surfaces. Clean walls, hard-surfaced floors and household surfaces with soap and water, then sanitize with a solution of 1 cup of bleach to 5 gallons of water. To clean actual mold growth from hard surfaces such as floors or countertops, wash with a solution of 1 cup bleach to 1 gallon water, rinse with clean water and allow to air dry. Ventilate the area while using any cleaning products. Never mix bleach with ammonia or other household cleaners — mixing bleach with cleaning products produces dangerous, toxic fumes.

Mattresses, upholstered furniture or other items that cannot be washed in hot water or dry cleaned should be air-dried in the sun and sprayed with disinfectant. Steam-clean carpets and wear boots and rubber gloves while cleaning. Not everything can be safely cleaned — some building materials damaged by prolonged exposure to moisture may have to be thrown out.

Attorney General Warns Of Dangers Of Synthetic Drugs Being Sold In S.D.

PIERRE — Attorney General Marty Jackley is warning South Dakota citizens of the dangers of using synthetic drug products for the purpose of intoxication and requesting local retailers' assistance.

These substances are labeled as "bath salts", K2, Spice, Posh or Blaze and have given rise to adverse health effects including death. As of July 1, 2011, law pro-

hibits the possession, selling or distributing of substances for the specific purpose of intoxication, excluding alcohol and prescription medications. These synthetic drugs mirror marijuana, cocaine or ecstasy.

The Attorney General's Office is working on providing further public notice to retailers that the knowing sale of these products for the purpose of intoxication

is illegal.

The Attorney General's Office and the Division of Criminal Investigation are encouraging store owners to rid their inventory of these extremely dangerous substances and refrain from the selling of these products to consumers.

"Synthetic drugs are being deceptive labeled to conceal and avoid reference to illegal drugs,"

said Jackley. "Law enforcement is seeking to work with our South Dakota businesses to avoid inadvertent sales and to warn of the dangerous health risks experienced by the use of these substances."
