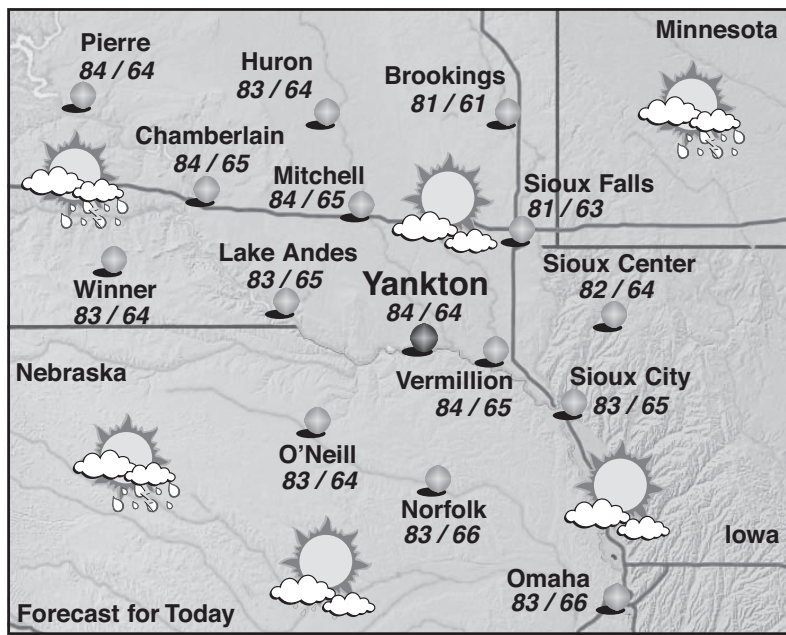

reservation, especially because of how much running is a big aspect of life there," said Duling, who was a national qualifier in the 400-meter hurdles last year. There was a problem, however. "The Girls on the Run program is only done as a fall and spring program, not as a summer program," she said. "And I needed it in the summer because of my schedule." Hoping to resolve the issue, Duling contacted the local Girls on the Run director in Sioux Falls. Unfortunately, she was told the idea wasn't going to work. "She thought the idea of bringing the program to the reservation was great, but she didn't think we were going to be able to execute it right then," Duling said. "She was really busy and didn't have time to do it." Not one to give up easily, Duling kept calling and emailing the director, hoping to change her mind. "I told her I would do all the work for it and that I would be able to successfully run this program," she said. "Finally, I convinced her to do it. It took a long time." Since it would be the first time a summer program would be attempted, approval was needed from the national office. Once again, permission for the program was denied. And, once again, Duling refused to give up. "I don't take no for an answer, so I decided to call the national office myself," she said. "I got in contact with someone and they gave me a list of reasons of why it wasn't going to work. I found a solution to all their problems, such as finding volunteers, funding and everything." Even when given the solutions, the national office still wouldn't return calls or emails. "I called the national office again and I asked to speak to the president," she said. "The secretary asked who was calling. I said 'Alexa Duling,' and she said 'Ohhhhh,' — like people around the office knew me because I called so many times. So she finally got me in touch with the right person and we got a 'yes' to do the program." While it took a lot of effort just to get approval, the work was just beginning, Duling said. "I was planning it kind of rushed, because I wanted to do it in the

summer, and they let me know in April," she said. Through contacts at USD, she located volunteers on the reservation, including a fitness specialist at the diabetes prevention program. Volunteers also included Duling's mother and sister, a former USD hurdler and a state cross country champion from Todd County. Duling then visited the reservation to give a presentation about Girls on the Run and signed up 15 girls for the program — the maximum number allowed. The total later dropped to 13 after two girls could no longer attend. The program began earlier this summer and met every Tuesday and Thursday for 10 weeks. Sessions addressed becoming a better person as an individual, as a teammate and finally as a community member. Running and activities were used to incorporate the lesson of each day, such as being thankful, being cooperative, listening and learning about values. "It was way more than anything I could have ever expected," Duling said about her experience with the girls. "To see each girl change throughout the program was so special. One girl in particular came in and was so quiet and hardly ever talked. By the end of the program, she was leading activities. To see that kind of growth take place in each girl in a different way was unbelievable." The program concluded earlier this month with its 5K run, which was partnered with the diabetes prevention program and included other participants. "Something that was really special about the 5K was that we had several other girls run ahead, but then the rest of the girls stayed and ran in a pack for the whole thing," she said. "And that to me was really special and showed the value the girls placed on teamwork. To see them all run together and support each other throughout the whole race was incredible." Duling said she was also pleased with the impact the program has had on the girls' everyday life. "I would ask the girls what they did on the weekend, and they would say 'My family came out to the track and we ran a little bit,' or 'My friends came out and we played a game on the track,'" she said. "Just knowing the impact that this has already on their lives and the fact that it has given them something positive to do is really special."

Master Gardener Class Open To All Experience Levels

SIoux CITY, Iowa — Anyone with an interest in gardening is invited to join the Iowa State University (ISU) Extension-Woodbury County fall Master Gardener class beginning Tuesday, Sept. 6. The class will continue meeting on Tuesday and Thursday evenings until Nov. 10. One class will be held on a Saturday at Iowa State University in Ames. Class sessions will be held from 6:15 to 9:30 p.m. at Woodbury County Extension, 4301 Sergeant Road, #209, Sioux City. "This will be our 29th Master Gardener class here at Woodbury County Extension," said Woodbury County Extension Horticulturist Mimi Shanahan. "Since 1986 more than 500 area residents have become Master Gardeners through Woodbury County Extension." The class is open to everyone with any level of gardening expertise. Some of the subjects covered in class include annual and perennial flowers, fruits and vegetables, houseplants, lawns, trees, entomology (insects), plant diseases, soils and fertilization. An all day Saturday trip to the

plant pathology and entomology labs on the Iowa State University campus in Ames will provide hands-on experience. In addition to the class time, each participant commits to 40 hours of volunteer service on garden related projects in the community. Projects have included community gardening projects at the Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center, Latham Park, Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center, and the June E. Nylan Cancer Center, amongst others. Plus, volunteers answer horticulture questions area residents call into Woodbury County Extension. Master Gardeners also assist in the planning and implementing of the Siouxland Garden Show. Registration deadline for the class is Friday, Sept. 2. Registrations will be accepted on a first come, first served basis. Class size is limited to 18.
