# **Tabor Rolls Past** Old Timers 16-2

MITCHELL — Just as his position in the batting order indicates, Chris Sutera got things going in a big way for the

The lead-off hitter had three hits and drove in three runs as Tabor made quick work of the Renner Old Timers 16-2 in seven innings Saturday afternoon at the S.D. State Class B Amateur Baseball Tournament at Mitchell's Cad-

Sutera singled, homered and tripled to spark a 16-hit attack for the Bluebirds (15-7), who are looking to make another run to the state championship game.

"I just tried to stay within myself; not do too much," Sutera said. "I was going for base hits and getting on any way I could. You can't be thinking home run out here." It was a similar approach for veteran Tabor catcher

Steve Fejfar, who was familiar with many of the legends on the Renner side — including starting pitcher Curt Cutler. Rather than overswinging against the soft-throwing

Cutler, Fejfar slowed things down. He responded by going 4-5 with two doubles, two singles and an RBI. "That actually brought back some memories for me," Fejfar said later. "I've played with some of them and

against most of them. "I knew (Curt) Cutler was a crafty guy; that he'd try to

No such worries, however. The Bluebirds scored three runs in the bottom of the

first inning, an RBI single from Jason Humpal and a 2-run single by Rob Keppen. An inning later, Sutera cracked a 2-run homer to right field, aided by a breeze blowing out of spacious Cadwell

Feifar and Humpal added RBI hits in the fourth to push

the lead to 7-0 after four innings.

Meanwhile on the mound for Tabor, starting pitcher

Doug Vanecek had no real issues in the early going. Despite issuing three walks and hitting another batter, Vanecek didn't allow a hit until the fourth inning when Don

Hegge singled.

"We were just hoping Doug could throw strikes and stay in there and battle," Tabor manager Gary Kortan said. "For the most part, he did that."

Vanecek ran into trouble in the top of the fifth, when the Old Timers loaded the bases on a single and two

walks. Reggie Ronken followed with a 2-run single, chasing Vanecek from the game. "When we gave a few of those runs back, it was good

that we had that early lead," Fejfar said.

The Bluebirds got those runs back in a big way in their next at-bat — getting an RBI single from Blase Vanecek, an RBI double from Jon Vavruska and an RBI triple by Sutera.

Up 10-2, Tabor was far from done. With the bases loaded and nobody out in the bottom of the sixth, Keppen drilled a 2-run single, Casey Comstock walked to bring in a run, Brian Supik had an RBI sacrifice

fly and Doug Vanecek added a 2-run single. The 14-run lead was never threatened, as Renner went down in order in the top of the seventh, ending the game

Aside from the offensive outburst, a bulk of the postgame chatter near the Tabor dugout centered around Tuesday night's second round game with Canova-Howard. The Gang routed Four Corners 15-0 in Saturday's early

Adding to the intrigue, Kortan said the two teams have never faced each other.

"We're looking forward to it," Kortan said. "It'll be a great crowd and hopefully a good game.'

Of course, if the Bluebirds are to make a repeat run to the Aug. 12 title game, beating Canova-Howard would be necessary. Not so easy, though, Feifar said.

"Canova's one of the toughest teams out here. They're never going to be easy to beat," he said. "We'll have to play a little bit better to get them.

"It's a big win," the Monarchs' head coach Kevin Knetsch said. "It was a battle the entire way. There was nothing easy. We scraped and clawed for everything we got."

"We've been through a lot of battles before so you just have to keep plugging away and trying to get better as the game goes," Knetsch said. "By large, we were able to do that right away by coming back and answering.

The Monarchs were able to answer in a big way by making adjustments along the way, according to Knetsch. A couple big hits by Nyhus derman were two keys in the Renner

"You never know what to expect coming in," Knetsch said. "Every game kind of has its own personality and its own feel. You've just got to make adjustments as you go. And we were able to do that today.'

Because of their sweep in Yankton, the Monarchs will now move into the winner's bracket of the State A tournament in Mitchell, facing the Brandon Valley Merchants on Friday. Castlewood will play an elimination game against the Black Hills A's on Friday in Mitchell.

FARGO, N.D. (AP) - North Dakota State senior center Joe Lund has opened plenty of holes in his career with the Bison. One of his toughest tasks this season might be getting his

Brandon Jemison grew up watching the Bison, which gave him an idea about high expectations long before last year's win over Sam Houston State for the school's first Division I title. But the team has never sold out the season before the season.

There's a lot of interest from the fans. They do hold us to a high standard," Jemison said. "But even our fans know that winning a national championship is a hard thing to do. It's not a given that any team is going to win it any year, let alone back-to-back.

Even so, Lund and Jemison said, anything less than a return trip to Frisco, Texas, would be a disappoint-

"Repeating would really be the only way to top that feeling," Jemison said.

The 2012 edition of the Bison looks a lot like last year's club. They have 13 players on defense with starting experience and eight starters on offense who have started at least one game. They have an experienced quarterback in Brock Jensen, a game-breaking return specialist in Ryan Smith and two defensive backs, Colten Heagle and Marcus Williams, who are getting national recognition on preseason honor teams. NDSU was picked to finish first in

the Missouri Valley Football Conference in a poll of league coaches, media and sports information directors.

"We know the media hype. Everyone wants to label us," Jemison said. "Either way, you are going to have to come out, week in and week out, and win games."

Missouri Valley coaches say NDSU's championship has helped improved credibility of the league that last won the national title with Youngstown State's victory in 1997.

"I know a lot us took a lot of pride in that," Illinois State coach Brock Spack said of the Bison title run. "And the way they did it. They kind of had their way with people all the way through the tournament. Very impressive."

### **Nebraska Native Competes In Olympic Pole Vault**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska native Jeremy Scott is getting ready to compete for an Olympic medal in the pole vault this week.

The Lincoln Journal Star reports that Scott, who grew up in Norfolk, Neb., believes he has a shot at a medal in the competition that starts Wednesday.

Scott didn't even start pole vaulting until he was 16.

The 31-year-old has spent nine years training with Bell Athletics in Jonesboro, Ark. That means he already knows several teammates because one of the other male pole vaulters and two women who are competing in the event also train there.

"Earl Bell has had at least one guy training with him on the Olympic team since he started coaching," Scott said.

Besides Scott, Derek Miles is another Bell pole vaulter who will compete for the United States. Becky Holliday, who earned a spot in Monday's final by clearing 4.55 meters, also trains with Bell and is part of the U.S. team. Israeli athlete Jillian Schwartz is another Bell athlete who fell short of making the pole vault finals.

Scott's training has helped him go from clearing 15-feet-2-inches in high school in 1999 to win the Nebraska state tournament to clearing 19-feet-1 1/4-inches in a recent

"I remember hitting 15 and that was a bit of a hard deal. As a freshman in college (Allegheny College), I went 16-2 or 16-3, but hitting 16 wasn't an issue," Scott said. "Then I was hitting 16-6 or 16-9 pretty regularly and couldn't make 17. It was a cursed height.

"Finally, I went 16-11 easily and then made 17-2. The following week, I went 17-7 and two weeks later, 18

Scott said Bell's greatest strength is helping pole vaulters master all the small decisions they have to make. "The pole vault isn't like the 100

meters, where you just go run. There are so many moving parts you can control and make decisions about," he said. "How high are your grips? Where is your run mark? The Scott went to Allegheny College to play football, but after breaking

his foot during his sophomore year he decided to focus on the pole vault. Scott's 6-foot-9 3/4-inch height earned him the nickname "El Grande" as a pole vaulter. Scott went on to win the indoor

and outdoor title in NCAA Division III. He was the runner-up at the U.S. indoor competition in 2003 and won the event in 2009. He also was the runner-up at the last two outdoor championships. "I don't know that it has sunk in
