



# NATIONAL RECOGNITION





At the National Science Olympiad in Orlando, Fla., in May, Yankton High School students Theresa and David Barnes took 18th in the nation in the "Sound of Music" division for the construction of homemade musical instruments. Thesesa, a junior, created a violin while David, a freshman, built a guitar. The instruments had to be constructed without the use of any commercial material except for the strings. David also wrote the bass music score for the contest. In honor of the Barnes' achievements, the National Music Museum in Vermillion has accepted the homemade instruments for display. Also, at the National History Day competition held in June in Maryland, Theresa won the National Affiliate Award for the best overall senior division entry from South Dakota. Her entry was a research paper on Dorothea Dix, a social reformer who created public awareness of the needs of the mentally ill, resulting in a national outcry for public mental hospitals.


