

# Yankton College Alumni **Open Doors To Education**

Opening doors to education and celebrating their 50th anniversary at the 2012 Yankton College All-Class Reunion were the reasons for the Yankton College Class of 1962 to establish the Class of 1962 Scholarship fund. Initiated by Carol (Kasulka '62) Boos of Tucson, Arizona, to create an ongoing gift to perpetuate the memory of Yankton College, Boos made the first contribution to the fund. Some of her classmates quickly joined in to create financial assistance to a deserving high school senior bound for college. Thinking it would be a one-time \$1,000 award, contributing classmates were genuinely surprised when the contributions kept on growing. Two additional \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded in the next two years and there is talk between them that more contributions are on the way.

Writing to each classmate, Boos said "Imagine the excitement of receiving a scholarship. Envision someone who really needs the money to take the edge off an already tight budget. The scholarship money would open the door to an education.'
