Sioux Falls Continues To Grow With Big-ticket Developments

SIOUX FALLS - Building-permit valuations this year are up \$100 million over last year, with a number of big-ticket items still expected to get started.

Though 2012 probably won't shape up to be a record year in permits — the \$523 million in 2007 set a high bar — it could come close if permits for a number of large planned projects, including the events center and Costco, go through yet this year.

Through July, Sioux Falls had issued permits totaling \$253 million, with new construction as well as remodeling and additions for residential and commercial segments all above average.

"It continues to show this is a viable market," said Michael Bender of Bender Commercial Real Estate Services. "It all starts with growth of jobs, and if we have job growth, we have people growth, and if we have people growth, we're going to have continued construction."

While residential and remodeling projects are running at a record high, the new commercial segment also is strong. So far this year, \$66.5 million in permits have been taken out — double the \$29.3 million last year.

Already in August, another large project, the Hilton Garden Inn hotel downtown, with a permit value of \$14.5 million, is going through the permit process. Other large projects, including the Scheels remodeling and expansion, the events center project and a proposed Costco store, would add millions in permit valuation to the city's books.

"I keep telling people internally, 'You guys, you've got to get ready because we're going to get swamped at the end of the year,' said Jeff Schmitt, the city's

chief planning and zoning official. Schmitt said a number of other projects are in the hopper but are not done deals, including a second Sam's Club that is progressing on the east side, and a possible third Wal-Mart somewhere in Sioux Falls.

At the beginning of the year, Schmitt said hitting \$300 million in permit valuations through the end of the year sounded like a

solid goal. "Now at \$253 (million), if Costco, Sam's Club, if all these things start happening, we're going to have a really big year. But a lot of things still have to happen to have that take place," Schmitt said.

So far this year, besides a few large institutional projects, such as a new middle school in Harrisburg, many of the commercial projects have been smaller. A number are \$1 million to \$2 million, Schmitt said.

Remodeling and addition projects for residential and commercial segments also remain strong. In fact, residential remodeling and additions are experiencing a record year, with \$25.5 million in permits.

"People continue to say: 'I'm going to continue to reinvest in my property. The economy is still not right to move. I'm going to put that new bathroom in,' "

Schmitt said. "They're still doing that, and they're starting to build.'

Whether it's commercial or residential, many in the industry said pent-up demand probably was a factor in the bump this year.

Bender said he expects the city can hit \$350 million in permits this year. He's not surprised that remodeling and additions continue to be a big chunk of the pie. He doesn't expect new construction to outpace additions and remodeling until at least next year.

"We're still in the last stages of people saying, 'I'm just going to stay, put I'm just going to expand,' "Bender said. "We're not seeing a ton of speculative construction. What you're seeing is really healthy construction. It's businesses that need to expand.'

Ron Nelson of Nelson Property Consultants said activity is brisk in a number of areas from retail to office and industrial.

He's the busiest he's ever been in the five years of his company.

"Everybody has been sitting on the sidelines for so long," said Nelson, who represented Costco in its Sioux Falls deal. Besides pent-up demand, low

interest rates probably are helping to push sales on the residential side. Trademark Homes has about a dozen homes it's working on,

and owner Erik Christensen said the company expects to have 22 closings this year. That's not its largest year ever, but the projects are larger, so Christensen expects a record year in dollar sales.

"People are thinking that it would be foolish not to build right now," he said of interest rates, adding that people are feeling better about the economy.

Copper Creek, a new development on the city's east side, is planning its third road extension since last fall to accommodate the swift sale of lots, said Ryan Jansa, residential development manager with VanBuskirk Cos., who is developing Copper Creek.

So far this year, the company has sold 47 lots and has another 15 pending at Copper Creek. The company has sold close to 100 lots in all 11 of its subdivisions.

In the past few years since the economy sputtered, its lots have sold almost exclusively to residents wanting to do a custom home. But this past year, about 30 percent of their sales have gone to builders doing speculative construction. "That's a major indicator of confidence in the market is when the builders see the turnover happening at a quick enough pace that they're confident in putting up a spec house and also the fact that the lenders are becoming more confident," Jansa said.

STURGIS (AP) — The South Dakota Highway Patrol says nine people died at the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally, which officially ended on Sunday.

The Patrol says eight people died in fatal accidents, including an Oakes, N.D., woman who was killed Friday when her motorcycle struck a pickup truck driven by a Colorado man.

Authorities say the victim, 43-year-old Sheila Coleman, was not wearing a helmet.

The Patrol says 50 people were injured in accidents during the rally, down from 80 last year.

Statistics released Sunday show that 251 people were arrested for driving drunk during the event, up from 235 last year. Misde-meanor drug arrests were up from 149 to 185. Felony drug arrests were down from 43 last year to 34 this year.

Preliminary reports show that traffic numbers were up over 2011.

S.D. House Candidates: Ryan Pick Helps Them

SIOUX FALLS (AP) - The Democratic and Republican candidates for South Dakota's lone House seat say they like the selection of Paul Ryan as Mitt Romney's running mate, albeit for different reasons

Republican Rep. Kristi Noem says she has interacted on several occasions with Ryan and believes Romney made a great decision for his vice presidential pick.

Noem calls Ryan a "bold leader who's been able to offer real so-lutions and tell people the truth."

Noem's challenger, Democrat Matt Varilek, tells the Argus Leader that Ryan's work on a controversial budget and health care plan will help Democrats rebuke Noem and others who supported

South Dakota Republican Gov. Dennis Daugaard says he hopes Ryan's expertise as chairman of the House Budget Committee will refocus the campaign on ideas and policy.

Calls Come Earlier This Year For Bat Business

CANTON (AP) — The owners of a South Dakota roofing company say they're getting more calls these days for their side business, which is bat removal and control.

Jim and Laura Woods, of Canton, say their bat business is usually not as busy this time of year. Generally the calls from homeowners begin to increase in September.

Laura Woods tells KELO-TV that the bats likely woke up early from hibernation because of the mild winter and it threw off their internal clocks. So they're heading inside earlier than normal.

Woods says her company, known as Nice Bats, is getting calls from as far away as Pierre, Brookings and Sioux City, Iowa.

Officials Report Decline In Foster Care Kids

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — Officials say the number of children in foster care is on the decline in South Dakota — and it's a good sign. Authorities say the 17 percent decline in the state's foster care

children since 2005 could be due in part to better support services for troubled families and more placements with extended family members.

The number of foster care children in South Dakota has dropped from 1,704 in 2005 to 1,404 in the last fiscal year. Records show that about 10 percent of those children in the state wind up being adopted.

Greg Boris, spokesman form South Dakota Voices for Children, tells the Argus Leader that he believes the state is moving in the right direction by trying to maintain children in the home.

S.D. Tourism Industry Is Having A Good Year

PIERRE (AP) — State officials report that South Dakota's tourism industry is having a good year.

The South Dakota Tourism Department says hotel occupancy statewide is up 7.8 percent so far this year, meaning hotels and motels are filling more rooms compared with the same period last year. Nationally, hotel occupancy is up only 3.4 percent.

Taxable sales reported by motels, campgrounds and other tourism-related businesses are up 7 percent for the year so far.

And the department reports that the number of new visitors to its primary tourism promotion website in the second quarter was up nearly 28 percent from a year earlier.

"With the interest rates as low as they are, if you have aspirations of ever building a new home and you let this period of time go by without doing it, it's going to cost you money eventually," he said.


LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - The Nebraska Game and Parks Commission says it plans to makeover a North Platte lake, starting this month when it kills off the lake's entire fish population.

The North Platte I-80 City Lake will be treated with the chemical rotenone on Aug. 21 to kill off the fish.

There will be no public access to the lake during the poisoning. Game and Parks is now salvaging desirable fish from the lake and stocking them in other I-80 lakes.

Game and Parks officials say undesirable species dominate the North Platte fishery, producing limited fishing opportunities. This fall, the commission will restock the lake with largemouth bass, bluegill and channel catfish, and additional fish species will be considered.

A ban on live bait fish at the lake will go into effect following the renovation.
