A Distant Voice

Band Brings The Legacy Of Patsy Cline To Dakota Theatre

After performing in the show "Always Patsy Cline," a musical tribute to the legendary singer, a few band members didn't want the experience to end.

So, the eight musicians decided to keep the music alive by forming their own band, Cassie and the

The band brings its talents to Yankton on Saturday, Aug. 25, playing shows at 3:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at Dakota Theatre. This event is sponsored by the Corps of Discovery Welcome Center.

Drummer Tony Ray, who also represents the group, said the band's journey started about three years ago.

"In Barrett, Minn., we have a community theatre, and they were putting on a show of the production, 'Always Patsy Cline.' They hired a few of us local musicians to put a band together, and when that was over we decided we wanted to keep it going," Ray said. "We went out on the road and started doing concerts."

The band found a willing audience to hear the music of Cline, who rose to musical stardom as a country artist who successfully crossed over onto the pop charts in the late 1950s and early '60s before dying in a plane crash in 1963 at age 30.

Lead guitarist Steve Ahles said when Cline performed and recorded, she had some of the finest Nashville musicians backing

"The level of the playing, for that time, was top notch," he said. "When she traveled around, she really didn't have her own band, so for the different cities that she was in, she would use bands (playing with) Johnny Cash or some of the artists she performed with. Sometimes if she was in a major city, she would just use a band they picked up. She didn't always know names called everybody 'Bob.' Her band was called the Bobcats. We kind of took off on that, and that's why our band is called Cassie and the

For singer Cassie Wiesner, performing is all about the enjoyment the audience experiences.

There are not a whole lot of Patsy Cline tribute artists," she said. "There's a handful of them, but not around here. We decided to see if it would fly. It took a while for us to get noticed, but we finally



"We just go where the people seem to really enjoy us. We tend to go where people call us back and want us back and we know that we're appreciated."

Wiesner has always had a love for Cline's music. In fact, it's the first music she can remember listening to as a child.

My mom was the first one to teach me about Patsy Cline," Wiesner said. "The very first song I can remember ever really thinking about or liking was a Patsy Cline song, because my mother taught me a little bit about harmonizing. I've always loved Patsy Cline, and even through all the bands that I've been in, I always wanted to sing a couple of Patsy Cline songs.

For Ray, it's important to keep Cline's music alive.
