Convocation, an invitation of membership to the university's academic community and a celebratory event for students and their families, starts with a procession at 3:30 p.m. from the North Complex to the DakotaDome. Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Chuck Staben, Dean of Students Kimberly Grieve and USD President James W. Abbott will lead the students in the official matriculation statement.

"Convocation is a special event for our new students, signaling the beginning of their academic journey," described Kimberly Grieve, dean of students at USD. "It also serves as a reminder that we are a campus community invested in student development and learning."

USD Welcome Week 2012 starts with Move-In Day at the DakotaDome parking lot. Students and their families are scheduled to check-in between 7:45 a.m. and 2 p.m. throughout the day. 2 Charged In Child's Death Plead Not Guilty

WAGNER (AP) — A Wagner couple accused of letting the body of a 2-year-old girl sit in a closet for nearly two days before reporting the death have pleaded not guilty to several charges.

Twenty-one-year-old Taylor Cournoyer and 28-year-old Laurie Cournoyer are charged with one count of failure to report a child's death, five counts of child abuse and various drug possession charges. Court documents allege the Cournoyers used sleeping pills, methamphetamine and marijuana during the day and a half the toddler's body was in the closet.

An 11-year-old boy living in the home also has been charged. Details of the charge have not been released because he is a juvenile.

 • The House leadership will try next Monday for a vote on a proposed amendment to the Constitution prohibiting the poll tax as a requirement for voting in federal elections. Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., said Monday the proposed amendment will be called up under a procedure requiring a favorable vote of two-thirds of the House members present. The bill has been lodged in the House Rules Committee since the Senate passed it March 27th.

• A new soviet nuclear test explosion in the atmosphere was registered today by Uppsala University's Seismological Institution. Uppsala scientists put the strength of the explosion at about nine megatons - equivalent to about nine million tons of TNT. That would make it the No. 3 biggest blast in size of the five explosions set off in the current soviet series.
