SDSU's Thiesse Tabbed To Guide MSU Mankato Women

MANKATO, Minn. — Emilee Thiesse, a Spearfish native with six years of NCAA Division I coaching experience, was named the eighth head coach in the history of the Minnesota State women's basketball program, the school announced Tuesday.

Thiesse most recently spent the last three seasons at South Dakota State where she served as recruiting coordinator and academic coordinator for the Jackrabbits.

SDSU made three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and won three straight Summit League titles and compiled a 65-34 overall record marking during this time.

Thiesse's sister, Amy Williams, is the head women's basketball coach at the University of South Dakota. Thiesse's husband, Brandon, is a native of Fairmont, Minn.

Prior to re-joining the Jackrabbit staff where she had worked as a graduate assistant coach from 2004-06, Thiesse spent three seasons as an assistant coach at Drake, helping guide the Bulldogs to NCAA Tournament in 2007 and a WNIT appearance in 2008. In her three seasons at Drake, the Bulldogs compiled a 56-42 overall record.

Thiesse, 31, played collegiately at Nebraska-Kearney from 2000-03 where the Lopers won Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference East Division titles and qualified for the NCAA Division II postseason each of her four seasons.

Oklahoma Boy Asked To Turn Michigan T-Shirt Inside Out

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — The Oklahoma City school district says it will review its dress code policy on college sports apparel after an elementary school student was told to turn his University of Michigan T-shirt inside out.

Shannon Barton told KWTN (http://bit.ly/NZSC7K) that the Huron Elementary School principal asked her 5-year-

old son, Cooper, to make the change last week and he changed behind a tree on the playground.

Barton says Cooper was told he could only wear University of Oklahoma or Oklahoma State University shirts. The dress code allows Oklahoma college apparel to be worn but bars other schools' clothing. The dress code was created in 2005 with the help of an anti-gang task force.

District spokeswoman Tierney Tinnin says Superintendent Karl Springer thinks the policy might be outdated.

Bill Would Help Injured Student Athletes In Calif.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — State lawmakers have approved first-in-the-nation legislation requiring California universities with the most high-profile sports programs to provide financial protections for student athletes who suffer career-ending injuries.

Schools would lose their athletic scholarships because of an injury suffered playing their sport. The bill also requires them to cover insurance deductibles and pay health care premiums for low-income athletes.

SB1525 would apply to universities that receive more than \$10 million annually in sports media revenue. The bill by Sen. Alex Padilla, a Democrat from Los Angeles, would apply this year to the University of Southern California, UCLA, Berkeley and Stanford University.

Stanford officials objected to the bill, which passed 24-10 Wednesday and was sent to Gov. Jerry Brown. The school's athletic director says including only four universities leaves out most California students.

Johnson: Strasburg Could Miss Final 2 To 3 Starts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nationals manager Davey Johnson says Stephen Strasburg could miss his final two or three turns in the rotation during the regular season.

In his first full season following elbow ligament replacement surgery, Strasburg is 15-5 with a 2.54 ERA and a National League-leading 183 strikeouts. The 24-year-old right-hander has thrown 145 1-3 innings, and the Nationals are thought to have given him a limit of 160-180.

"I think it came out that with the off days, we'd need another starter for I think two starts," Johnson said after talking with general manager Mike Rizzo. "I think two starts, which have been three."

Washington began the day with a seven-game lead in the NL East, putting the city on track for postseason play for the first time since 1933.

The Nationals followed a similar plan last season with right-hander Jordan Zimmermann. The 26-year-old right-hander is 9-7 with a 2.54 ERA that ranks second in the NL.

"It's funny, there wasn't anything said when we shut down Zimmermann," Johnson said. Last year, Johnson announced a pitcher for Zimmermann's slot before he had the chance to inform all involved. He intends to change that this year.

"Everybody in the world will know about this one," Johnson said. Washington began the day
