The Book Shelf

ines' Offers Creative Fairy Tale

"Between the Lines," by Jodi Picoult and Samantha Van Leer, Simon & Schuster, Inc, 2012. 368 pages. For ages 12 and up.


Fairy tales are great because we know how they end. The prince always saves the princess and they live happily ever after. But what if that's not what the prince or princess wants? Does it have to be that way?

Delilah is a 15-year-old loner, with one friend to her name. She just doesn't fit in with the popular kids, especially after she breaks the knee of the head cheerleader. She'd much rather find her friends in books. For some reason, she's intrigued by a hand-drawn original book in the school library, a fairy tale actually.

Delilah reads the book once, then reads it again. And again. Something about Oliver, the prince in the book, draws her. He's on a quest to save a princess from an evil man, but he's not brave. His father died fighting a dragon. Delilah can sympathize with what it's like to grow up without a dad. To Delilah, it just feels like Oliver is looking right into her eves. Oliver understands her.

So even though she knows it's bordering on insane, she keeps reading about Oliver over and over. Finally, though, she decides she needs to return the book and try to live a normal life. Right after one last time reading it ...

This time, though, something seems off. Delilah reads through the entire book until she spots it — on the last page where the



prince and princess get married on the beach. She sees a chessboard drawn into the sand. It's never been there before.

She flips to page 43, where the prince is scaling a cliff with a knife in his teeth. And she sees him carve the words "help me" into

Oliver has tried to contact readers of the book before. He's sung at the top of his lungs. Or waited until the last minute to jump into the story when the book is being opened. No matter what he does, though, he and the other characters are pulled, as if by a magnetic force, into their positions as the book is opened. And they all dutifully say their lines and act their parts. When the book closes, however, they are all free to live their own lives until the book opens again.

The wicked villain is actually a nice guy who likes to paint and try new recipes. Oliver is not in love with the princess. And Oliver is getting tired of it all. He's realizing there's another whole world where the readers live. He can see their faces, hear their conversations and see their surroundings. What would it be like to explore that world, he wonders. A world where anything could happen, where his whole life isn't a script for him to act out over and over again. But despite his attempts, he can't communicate with them.

Úntil this one. Delilah.

Delilah is sure she's losing it, but she loves talking to Oliver. They become close friends and try to find a way for Oliver to leave the book so they can actually meet in

This book is different from much of what's out there for books, but in a good way. It stretches the imagination which is fun for any age. Take a read through it — you might see fairy tales in a whole new realm.
