Yankton proved that the first game was no fluke, as it once again posted a dominating victory (35-14) to finish the year undefeated at 13-0. The Bucks handed Washington its only two losses of the 2002 season, as the Warriors fin-

Now nine years removed from high school and a sense of "Warrior pride," I am ready to follow the Bucks through an exciting year of football action. However, when Sioux Falls Washington rolls into town on Oct. 5, I am sure that I will feel at least a little bit of nostalgia from that first Yankton football experience a decade ago.

LAWRENCE, Kan. — The South Dakota State women's soccer team tied UNLV 0-0 (2 OT) in its Kansas Invitational opener on Friday afternoon.

Both teams entered the weekend 1-1 after splitting a pair of games on opening weekend.

Meyer retired from coaching two years ago with an NCAA record 923 victories. His heart problems that included needing three valves replaced were related to cancer that doctors discovered after a 2008 car accident that cost Meyer part of his left leg.

In addition, Nord has coached the junior varsity team at Duluth Central High School (2008-09) and was the head coach of the Northern Lights AAU team in 2009.

Nord played collegiately at the University of Wisconsin-Superior for three seasons, serving as team captain for one year. She averaged more than 10 points per game for her career, including an average of 10.3 points per game during the 2007-08 campaign, when she shot 45 percent from behind the three-point line.
