generation. The Leineses said they are proud that their four children remained in the Wagner area and became involved with the Labor Day Committee and Wagner fire department.

"They saw how we were involved as they were growing up, and I am glad they have taken on the task of making Wagner a better place," Jim told the *Post*.

"It's really important to keep the young people around. Without them, our town would probably go away eventually," Shirley told the *Post*.

While the parade draws much of the attention, the Labor Day celebration contains three days packed with activities for all ages, Greger said. In addition, the Merriam Midway Carnival opens at noon all three days on Main Street.

Saturday's schedule includes a road race, kids parade, poker run, kids tractor pull, Labor Day Queen contest, Tri-State Cage Fighting and rodeo.

"With the poker run, we changed it up a little bit this year," Greger said. "They are starting at Fort Randall Casino at 11 a.m. and have to return by 5 p.m."

Along the way, riders will follow a route that takes them to 10 stops in Wagner, Tyndall, Springfield, Running Water, Avon and Dante.

The Tri-State Cage Fighting has become a popular draw for both entrants and spectators, Greger said.

"We have 32 fighters, so we are looking at 16 fights," he said. "We have four or five local fighters, but we also have them coming from as far away as Grand Island (Neb.) and Sioux City. We have gotten a good response."

Sunday's schedule includes the Festival in the Park, a Figure 8 race, the Historical Society hospitality, barbecue cook-off and bean bag tournament, rodeo and dance featuring the Rat Pac.

The rodeo, sponsored by the Wagner Saddle Club, features 10 major events.

Besides the parade, Monday's schedule includes the Festival in the Park, the Historical Society hospitality, the Show & Shine Display and Labor Day Cruise, kids money sandpile and races at Wag-

ner Speedway.

"We are having the Show and Shine car show at the Wagner Lake," Greger said. "When they are done at 2 p.m., we will do what we call Cruise Day. We will take the cars for display at Lake Andes, at Pickstown and back to Wagner."

The Show & Shine road trip replaces the Cruise Night formerly held during the Labor Day Celebration, Greger said.

The Labor Day celebration requires a tremendous amount of behind-the-scenes work, Greger said. He credited the help of volunteers, law enforcement and city employees.

"Without them, we wouldn't have a Labor Day celebration," he said.

The City of Wagner provides labor and helps cover costs for the weekend, said Finance Officer Rebecca Brunsing.

"We pay for extra security for the celebration. This year's cost is approximately \$6,000," she said.

"Our janitor works at the armory all weekend for the events held there. We have a maintenance person on-call for whatever may need to be taken care of. We move the bleachers from event to event, and (workers) move barricades where needed throughout the weekend."

The city and residents also as-

sist in keeping up the town's appearance throughout the celebration, Brunsing said.

"We make sure the highway and side streets are swept right before the celebration," she said. "We also have a beautification committee that volunteers and makes sure the parade route is clean."

In addition, the city provides its portable toilets to the Labor Day committee for use at no cost, she said.

The Labor Day committee, and the Wagner community in general, work to provide a celebration that is family friendly and affordable, Greger said.

"We have a variety of events for everyone. We like to keep people interested," he said. "We still have a lot of people with hometown roots, and they all love to come back and spend Labor Day weekend in Wagner. It makes the town proud to have people come here and support us every year."
