

## Monday, August 1, 1938

• The governor's office today received a letter from Pearl Baker of Chillicothe, Mo., asking help in locating a man named Baker "either on the relief rolls or WPA" in South Dakota. The man, the letter said, is heir to \$37,000 estate left by "crippled Billie Baker." The letter will be referred to the state WPA headquarters at Mitchell.

• Two small sons of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Talsma, farm family living southwest of Springfield, Darrow, 6 and Donald, 4, are in Sacred Heart hospital here suffering from severe burns received in the explosion of a gasoline stove at their home Saturday afternoon.

• Quail whistling counts completed in a tier of southern and southeastern South Dakota counties show good populations of the bobwhite. Clayton Bushong, assistant chief of game management for the department of game, fish and parks, said surveys were conducted in late June and the first week in July in Union, Clay, Yankton, Bon Homme, Charles Mix, Gregory and Tripp counties.

• Dr. S. R. Neil, Niobrara, Neb.,

landed his Navion 105 airplane at about 10:30 a.m. today on the main runway of the Yankton airport without difficulty although his wheels were retracted. He was flying to Menno to visit with M. E. Ulmer when he found that one of his wheels would not come down. He accordingly retracted the other wheels and flew to Yankton to land where there is a better runway.

## 25 YEARS AGO

## Monday, August 1, 1988

• A major campaign to raise \$45,000 for the construction of the Dakota Territorial Capitol is beginning this week. Dan Orton, president of the Yankton Sertoma Club, which has pledged to build the replica of the Capitol as a state Centennial project, made the announcement today. The club announced its intentions to build the historic landmark this spring and has since explored a number of funding options.

• Preliminary figures show that the last two months were the driest June-July period on record in Sioux Falls, the National Weather Service reported Saturday. Last month was the third driest June on record, with just 0.91 of an inch of rain recorded, and July so far is the fourth-driest on record, with a total of 0.49 of an inch of rain.

## Investigation Clears Up Alleged Burglary

After further investigation, it has been determined that what appeared to be a home burglary in Irene Monday was in fact not a crime.

A Yankton County deputy was traveling through Irene at approximately 6 p.m. Monday when he was flagged down by an individual. The man said he saw people breaking into a house in a part of Irene that is within Clay County.

The deputy apprehended several individuals as the apparent burglary was in progress and turned them over to the Clay County Sheriff's Office for further investigation. Additionally, deputies in Yankton County recovered some of the property related to the case in a vehicle at a trailer court east of Yankton where the suspects were staying.

Clay County Sheriff Andy Howe said Wednesday that there was some confusion in the case because the home was going through a foreclosure. He explained that, once a foreclosure sale is conducted, the defendants have a redemption period — generally 180 days — during which they still have a right of access to the property.

In this case, the bank that was taking ownership of the home changed the locks and posted no trespassing signs during that redemption period. No one was living in the house, and the bank was trying to protect the property, Howe said.

"The people there assumed that, with the locks changed, they weren't supposed to be there. But they wanted to get their property out, so they broke in and got it," he continued. "You can imagine what the neighbors thought of that."

"(The individuals) broke in, so it appeared like a real burglary," Howe stated. "I think everybody was well-meaning there, and the officer responded appropriately. Thankfully, with a little more investigation, we found they did still have a right of access."

Although several people were present at the home, the Clay County Sheriff's Office took two males believed to have actually broken into the home into custody during the investigation. They were booked into the jail around 9 p.m. Monday and released at approximately 10:30 a.m. Tuesday.

Howe said there will be no charges filed in the case and that any property taken as evidence in Clay and Yankton counties will be returned to the owner.

## Beware Of Lottery Scams

PIERRE — South Dakota Lottery officials are urging players to not be taken in by a scam that promises them winnings from a second chance Mega Millions drawing.

The Lottery has been notified by more than a dozen players, all lotto or scratch ticket winners, who have received phone calls from an individual claiming to be with the South Dakota Lottery who advised them that their prizes made them eligible for a second chance Mega Millions drawing. The caller then went on to tell the player that they had won a \$5 million second prize in the drawing and that representatives from the South Dakota Lottery would be delivering that prize in person. Lottery Director Norm Lingle cautions the public not to be fooled if they are contacted.

"The Lottery never enters someone into a drawing, promotion for an added bonus or prize, or for any other reason without that person's knowledge," Lingle said. "If you are contacted by the scammer, either by phone or some other method such as e-

mail, we urge you to contact local law enforcement and the Consumer Protection unit of the South Dakota Attorney General's office at 1-800-300-1986."

Lingle says it's also a good idea to check with his agency to see if such calls or e-mails are legitimate before taking any action requested by the scammer. The Lottery maintains three validation centers across the state in Pierre (605-773-5770), Rapid City (605-394-5106) and Sioux Falls (605-367-5840).

In at least one reported case, the scammer requested the victim purchase a Green Dot Card to receive their winnings. Lingle also advises those contacted to not provide any personal information, including credit card and bank account numbers, if requested by the caller.

Lottery prizes of \$101 or more must be claimed at a Lottery office using an official prize claim form. For more information on avoiding lottery scams, visit <http://lottery.sd.gov/responsibly/scams/>.
