

Length, Money **Attracts Pros To** Hillcrest Pro-Am

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Forty_years ago, the Hillcrest Invitational Pro-Am offered a total prize package of \$11,000 for professional golfers.

As time has passed, that amount has increased.

Now as the 4-day pro-am – which begins today (Thursday) at Hillcrest Golf & Country Club — celebrates its 40th anniversary, that monetary potential has jumped to

The total amount includes all the events during the week, including Tuesday's Ladies Pro-Am and a putting contest, according to Hillcrest

head PGA pro Sean Riley. "That's a huge draw for these pros, having that much money at stake," Riley said Wednesday. "That's a lot of money for one tour-

A total of 208 golfers, including 67 professionals, will take to the course for the pro-am, which is the longest event on the summer-long Dakotas

The combination of a high payout and a long weekend attracts some of the top pros, according to Neil Johnson who won the Hillcrest pro title last year.

'We like it because it's a shootout, not a marathon," Johnson said Wednesday. "There are a lot of little challenges here, more than the normal two or three day events.

Johnson, a 31-year-old from River Falls, Wis., has spent most of the summer in Canada on the PGA Tour Canada. He will be joined at Hillcrest her golfers zger, Josh Persons and Brady Schnell) who played on the Canadian tour.

"It's always fun to come back for

this one," Johnson said. Hillcrest also boasts one of the largest pro qualifiers on the Dakotas Tour, Riley said, referencing Tuesday's field of nearly 50 golfers for 27

The field will be cut after Saturday's third round, trimming the number down to the top 30 amateurs (plus ties) and 25-30 pros (plus ties) the second of which is an increase this year.

Ponder Still Under Pressure, Beginning Season 3

MANKATO, Minn. (AP) — The scrutiny Christian Ponder endured last season could pale next to what he'll encounter this year as Minnesota's quarterback.

Ponder improved statistically from his rookie season, and the Vikings won seven more games to make the playoffs. But those developments didn't quiet the questions about whether the former firstround draft pick fits the franchise's

"I have more confidence," Ponder said. "It comes with experience. Last year, we were a playoff team. That gave everybody confidence."

The third year of Ponder's career will determine whether he's the answer or not. With Adrian Peterson coming off a 2.000-yard rushing season, an offensive line intact from the

year before and upgraded group of receivers, Ponder should have more support than he did last season.

There is clearly plenty of pressure on him, particularly with Peterson in his prime at the one of the game's most punishing positions



BILLINGS, Mont. — Clouds collected and rolled over the Rimrock Mountains overlooking Dehler Stadium threatening to force an early end to the Pioneer Baseball League game between the Missoula Osprey and the Billings Mustangs earlier this summer.

There was another dark storm looming over Yankton native Layne Somsen: being called out of the Mustangs' bullpen in the top of the fourth inning into a bases-

loaded jam with no outs recorded. Somsen

calmly took to the bump and retired three straight batters to keep the Osprey

from putting any more runs on the board. The right-handed Somsen then pitched another inning without allowing an earned run, before handing over the ball to teammate Nick Fleece in the top of the sixth. Despite Somsen's efforts, Billings dropped the north di-

vision game to Missoula by a score of 6-1. But the game against Missoula is symbolic of the pressures and immediate changes that Somsen has gone

through in his two months with the rookie-league team affiliated with the Cincinnati Reds. The first change was going from the comforts of his basement couch with no immediate plans for the sum-

Alex Rodriguez Mum As MLB Drug Suspension Looms

TAMPA. Fla. (AP) — Alex Rodriguez didn't stop to talk with reporters after his rehabilitation session at the team's minor league complex, two days before Major League Baseball is likely to suspend the New York Yankees third baseman for his connection to a clinic accused of distributing banned performance-enhancing

Coming back from January hip surgery and a late-July strained quadriceps, Rodriguez increased the intensity of his leg workout by taking on-field batting practice and running the bases at the Yankees' minor league complex.

A-Rod felt tightness in the quad before the Triple-A

Scranton/Wilkes-Barre game on July 20. Yankees general manager Brian Cashman said he will play in a simulated game Thursday at the minor league complex.

Rodriguez could be sent to Double-A Trenton for a new rehab assignment on Friday. Scranton is on the road.

"Tomorrow's simulated game is the first step in that process and then I just don't want to get anything past tomorrow just because of the weather, but the plan would be for him to be in a rehab game on Friday," Cashman said.

A suspension would prevent Rodriguez from playing in any major or minor league games unless the penalty is stayed.

New York has made the playoffs in 17 of the last 18 seasons but is fourth in the AL East, 8 1/2 games behind division-leading Tampa Bay and 3 1/2 games back of Baltimore for the last wild-card

"You have to walk before you can run, and right now obviously we're closer to the wild card than the division," Cashman said. "So I didn't say we can't win the division, but right now if somebody says 8 1/2, I'll say 3 1/2."

While Rodriguez's status is uncertain, outfielder Curtis Granderson could rejoin the Yankees for Friday's series opener at San Diego. Granderson broke an arm in the Yankees' spring training

opener, returned May 14, then broke a pinkie on May 24.

"I think we're shooting for Friday for an activation on Granderson. Hopefully Alex will be back shortly thereafter," Cashman said.

He thinks there's a chance third baseman Kevin Youkilis could return this season from a back injury but doesn't expect catcher Francisco Cervelli to heal in time from elbow and finger injuries. Cervelli, also tied in media reports to the Biogenesis case, is to be examined Aug. 5 by Dr. James Andrews.

"It's looking more and more like it's going to be unrealistic to see Cervelli," Cashman said.


