The story centers around the Reluctant Dragon (Jordan Kuipers), a peaceful being that likes tea, poetry and naps.

"He's a dragon who doesn't want to fight," said director Allison Spak. "He just wants to live in peace and write his sonnets.

A young boy, Jon (Jaden Pearson), discovers the dragon, and the two become friends.

However, when the creature is discovered by the townsfolk, they send for dragon-slayer St. George (Shaun Morkve) to rid them of it, unaware of the dragon's gentle nature. It is then up to Jon to devise a plan to rescue his new friend.

"The kid is basically trying to save the dragon from all these people that want to kill him because they're afraid of the beast," Spak said. "In the end, they learn what the dragon is truly like.'

The director said the play teaches a valuable lesson, for children and adults alike, about how it is important to learn about people before forming opinions about them.

"First impressions aren't always everything," Spak said. "You need to be open and get to know a person.'

'It's a great message about how you shouldn't judge a book by its cover," Kuipers added.

The play is being presented as part of the creative drama program sponsored by the City of Yankton. Unlike other productions, the summer program offers children a spot in the play just by signing up, although auditions are needed for roles.

The goal of the creative drama program is to offer children another choice for an activity during the summer, as well as to inspire their creativity, Spak said.
