Amateur Baseball: Lesterville Headed To State For First Time Since 1997

The community of Lesterville has a rich history of amateur baseball, but its hometown team, the Broncs, had not been to a state tournament since 1997.

That changed on Thursday night in Scotland, when the Broncs qualified for state with an 8-5 victory over Freeman in the District 6B Tournament.

"This morning was awesome," said Broncs manager Kevin Bloch, the only remnant of the 1997 team still in uniform. "I got a lot of calls from former players congratulating us.

Despite the 16-year absense from state, the fifthseeded Broncs were

business-as-usual as they prepped for the matchup with the seventh-seeded Black Sox.

"We tried to stay focused. We wanted to get the job done and not have to play on Saturday," said Mike Pavel, who first played for the Broncs as a Legion pickup player in 1999. "We knew we have the talent. It was whether or not we came ready to play."

But the potential historical moment still hung in the minds of some players, especially a veteran like Darrin Svacina.

"We were all excited, knowing that we had a good chance," he said. "We thought that last night would be our best chance to go to

The Broncs got off to a quick start, scoring five runs in the second inning to get on the board, then adding two to build up a 7-0 lead.

"It helped a lot," said Tyler Edler, who went the distance on the mound in Thursday's victory. "(Freeman starter) Brett Scherschligt had pitched against us earlier this year, and beat us 8-2. Then the way he pitched against Wynot (2-1 Freeman win earlier in the tournament), he was hitting his spots.

"When we got out 5-0, it took a load off."

Lesterville took an 8-1 lead into the ninth, when the Black Sox got on a roll. A pair of bad-bounce hits helped Freeman get to within three, 8-5, with Scherschligt — Freeman's top power threat —

standing at the plate as the tying run.

"We tried to keep doing what we'd been doing, keep cool," Pavel said. "When you panic, that's when things fall

apart." Edler, though, admitted he was on edge in that situation.

"I was nervous, and I know everyone else was, too. It was not a bad situation for them (Freeman)," he said. "My blood pressure was pretty high, and (Bloch) said his blood pressure was pretty high at that point, too.'

Scherschligt's ground ball back to Edler sent the Broncs back to state, and set off a few debates on Thursday night.

"It's been exciting for a lot

The phrase 'when it rains, it pours' made literal sense on Friday at Yankton's Hillcrest Golf & Country Club.

One rain delay became two, and eventually three.

Eventually, though, the group of 208 professional and amateur golfers were able to finish their second rounds Friday at the 40th annual Hillcrest Invitational Pro-Am.

Klinton Krieger, a thirdyear pro from Cheyenne, Wyo., pointed out that golfers typically prepare for any kind of weather — from 95-degree days like Hillcrest saw last summer to persistent downpours like Friday.

"If you're really prepared for it, you should be OK," Krieger said during a delay. "Everything is wet, but you just have to deal with it as best you can. At least everyone's dealing with it at the same time.'

Rainy conditions prompted three delays on the day, pushing back the morning group nearly five hours. and the afternoon group back, as well.

There was a nearly hourlong delay in the morning, and another one at noon that lasted until 2 p.m. Golfers were sent back out, only to be called back after 15 minutes when rain started pouring.

That delay lasted until around 4 p.m., when the weather finally relented enough that play could resume. From there, the rest of the day was fine and every group was able to finish.

Sean Riley, the head PGA pro at Hillcrest, made an announcement during the final delay that was in part to provide updates but also to help alleviate concerns by golfers.

"We don't want to scrap the day," he said, later adding, "This is a preparatory tour for the PGA; they don't scrap rounds. The tour can't control it and we can't control it."
