Sen. Saxby Chambliss said "the chatter" intercepted by U.S. intelligence agencies led the Obama administration to shutter the embassies and consulates and issue a global travel warning to Americans.

"Chatter means conversation among terrorists about the planning that's going on — very reminiscent of what we saw pre-9/11," Chambliss, R-Ga., told NBC's "Meet the Press."

"This is the most serious threat that I've seen in the last several years," he said.

Rep. C.A. Dutch Ruppersberger of Maryland, the top Democrat on the House Intelligence Committee, told ABC's "This Week" that the threat intercepted from "high-level people in al-Qaida in the Arabian Peninsula" was about a "major attack."

Yemen is home to al-Qaida's most dangerous affiliate, blamed for several notable terrorist plots on the United States. They include the foiled

"This way, we can respond and within five minutes we're in the building to check it out," he said. "The key holder doesn't even have to be there. We can call them up the next morning and say, 'I was in your building. This is what happened.'"

"This system has helped us out in more than one case where we got there and found smoke," Nickles added. "In most cases, we are able to correct the problem before the fire department is even called."

Other cases have revealed a broken water line and even a caved-in roof due to because a sprinkler system went off.

Some property owners have been reluctant to spend the money to purchase a box, despite suggestions from fire officials.

"Part of it is the price, or they feel that, since they've never had a problem, they don't need it," Nickles said. "But when you break out a \$1,000 door because you didn't have keys, like what happened at one incident, a lock box doesn't look as expensive."

The boxes have not led to any security problems, according to Nickles. They are bolted to the building, weigh about 25 pounds and offer vault-grade protection to their contents, he said.

In addition to Nickles, Fire Chief Tom Kurtenbach has a master key.

"We have a system installed in one engine on each side of town that is electronic," Nickles added. "Our volunteer captains have a code that gets them in to release the keys. We know they've been in it, so it's pretty secure."

Paramedics with the Yankton County EMS also have master keys.

"We will not allow the key to be used for anything but a fire department or ambulance emergency," Nickles said. "We've been called by tenants who have locked their keys in the apartment. We have it in our policy that we cannot assist them and tell them they need to call a locksmith or someone else."

While the ordinance is aimed at buildings with alarm and/or sprinkler systems,

Christmas Day 2009 effort to bomb an airliner over Detroit and the explosives-laden parcels intercepted the following year aboard cargo flights.

Rep. Peter King, who leads the House Homeland Security subcommittee on counterterrorism and intelligence, said the threat included dates but not locations of possible attacks.

"The threat was specific as to how enormous it was going to be and also that certain dates were given," King, R-N.Y., said on ABC.

Rep. Adam Schiff, a House Intelligence Committee member, said the "breadth" of the closures suggests U.S. authorities are concerned about a potential repeat of last year's riots and attacks at multiple embassies, including the deadly assault in Benghazi, Libya, where the U.S. ambassador and three other Americans were killed.

In addition, Interpol, the French-based international policy agency, has issued a global security alert in connection with suspected al-Qaida involvement in several recent prison escapes including those in Iraq, Libya and Pakistan.

Those prison breaks add to the concerns about an attack, said Schiff, D-Calif., also noting the approaching end of the Islamic holy month of Ramadan.

"So you have a lot of things coming together. ... But all of that would not be enough without having some particularly specific information," he said.

The Obama administration's decision to close the embassies and the lawmakers' general discussion about the threats come at a sensitive time as the government tries to defend recently disclosed surveillance programs that have stirred deep privacy concerns and raised the potential of the first serious retrenchment in terrorism-fighting efforts since Sept. 11.

The Senate Judiciary Committee chairman has scoffed at the assertion by the head of the National Security Agency that government methods used to collect telephone and email data have helped foil 54 terror plots.

Schiff said he has seen no evidence linking the latest warnings to that agency's collection of "vast amounts of domestic data."

Woman Dies In Crash Near Elk Point

ELK POINT — An Ohio woman died Saturday when the motorcycle she was operating struck debris on Interstate 29 near Elk Point.

Carolee Weaver, 49, of Luckey, Ohio, was northbound riding a 1992 Harley Davidson motorcycle. She was riding in a staggered formation of four motorcycles. The lead rider, Brent A. Weaver, 52, of Luckey, Ohio, was riding a 1983 Harley Davidson. At the crest of a hill, he saw a tire and wheel in the driving lane. His motorcycle hit the tire and went down. The collision knocked the tire into the path of Carolee Weaver's motorcycle, which struck it. Both riders were thrown from their motorcycles.

Carolee Weaver was dead at the scene. Brent Weaver was taken to a Sioux City hospital with serious injuries. Neither rider was wearing a helmet.

No further information is immediately available.

The South Dakota Highway Patrol is investigating. Union County Sheriff's Department, Elk Point Police Department, Elk Point Fire Department and Elk Point Ambulance assisted.
