## **Obamacare Slowing** Growth, Thune Says

Uncertainty surrounding the Affordable Care Act is one of the primary hindrances to the country's economic growth, according to Sen. John Thune (R-S.D)

# **County Commission: No Need To Fix** What Isn't **Broken**

Yankton Co. Not Likely To **Consolidate Elected Offices**

After an informational session Tuesday, it doesn't appear the Yankton County Commission will pursue the consolidation of any elected offices in the near future.

Commissioner Garry Moore suggested to the commission earlier this year that the option allowed under state law may be of benefit to the county. The commission agreed to have a question-and-answer session via teleconference with South Dakota Association of County Commissioners Executive Director Bob Wilcox and Hughes County Manager Kevin Hipple to learn more about it.

Although the state statute allowing county commissions to combine two or more county offices through an ordinance that has existed for more than a decade, only four counties



ister of deeds and treasurer offices; and Perkins County has combined the auditor and treasurer offices.

Wilcox speculated that the law may have been passed with sparsely-populated counties in mind.

Hughes County combined its three offices around the turn of the millennium, according to Hipple. A finance officer, who is elected every four years, now oversees the offices.

"Our commission chose to do that when they had two of those (elected) officers leaving, so they had an opportunity where they did not have to displace an existing elected official," Hipple said. "The person who was elected finance officer was already a county employee and served in that position until early this year, when we got our second-ever finance officer. "For our purposes, it's worked very well," he continued. "We have a finance officer, and then she has chief deputies (in each of the offices). What that does

"I've talked to employers here in South Dakota, and I've talked to employers all across the country," the senator said. "One of the recurring themes that you hear is, 'We don't know how this is going to impact us. We don't like all the mandates. We don't like the taxes associated with it. And we're really concerned with how it's going to impact our bottom lines.

One of the health care law's stipulations is that businesses with at least 50 employees

struggling to comply with the law.

"All these forces are converging on the economy at a time when the economy is kind of sputtering, and there's just a lot of uncertainty on what the impacts are going to be,' he said. "Therefore, I think a lot of employers are saying, 'We're not going to hire people, and we might encourage people to take parttime work as opposed to full-time work.' And I think that's having a real impact on the unem-

## Muralist's Career Paints A Broad Stroke



IRENE - When he was painting a mural in a Vermillion bar several years ago, Greg Preheim attracted some celebrity spectators.

"I was painting (University of South Dakota mascot) Charlie Coyote at the bar, and he was surrounded by a group of co-eds with the phrase 'Everybody Needs A Hobby,'" he said.

The Irene artist noticed he had drawn an audience - USA Today founder Al Neuharth, a USD alumnus, and NBC's Meet The Press moderator Tim Russert. Both men were on the USD campus for Russert's acceptance of the Al Neuharth Award for Excellence in the Media.

Neuharth and Russert have passed away, but the memory re-



"They were just watching me paint," Preheim said with a smile. 'I turned around and said, 'I'm a big fan, can I get an autograph?' Preheim has drawn many admirers himself during the past

half-century. He has rolled out thousands of handpainted scenes on 'canvases" ranging from bedrooms and billboards to casinos and race tracks.

"I have been doing this for  $50\,$ years, since 1963," he said. "I started doing it full-time, professionally, right after I graduated from Irene High School and received my sales-tax license.'

### Wakonda Man **Pleads Not Guilty** In Sex Abuse Case

VERMILLION - A Wakonda man has pleaded not guilty to two counts involving the abuse of a 13-year-old girl.

Larry Rederick, 38, appeared in the Clay County Courthouse Tuesday morning in regard to the charges of sexual contact with a child under 16 and sexual exploitation of a minor.

Rederick was indicted by a Clay County grand jury on Aug. 1 after an investigation by the Clay County Sheriff's Office.

Judge Glen Eng said Tuesday that if Rederick is convicted, there will be an enhancement of the charges due to prior convictions, with sexual contact being considered a Class 2 felony and sexual exploitation a Class 5 felony.

If he is convicted of the enhanced charges, Rederick will face a maximum of 25 years in the
