Neb. Transportation Revision Announced

LINCOLN, Neb. — The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) requires each state highway agency to develop a Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP must list all highway and transit projects that will be using federal funds, as well as all regionally significant transportation projects using non-federal funding sources. It covers a period of four years and in Nebraska is updated every year on Oct. 1. Periodically, the Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) must amend the STIP for reasons such as; to add or remove projects, to make adjustments to funding sources or estimates or to update a project's scope of work. Federal law requires that all citizens and other interested parties in the State's transportation planning process be given reasonable opportunity to comment on the proposed STIP and on any proposed amendments to an approved STIP. NDOR uses statewide news releases and an automated email subscription management system called GovDelivery to inform the public and advise them of the means and time period to comment on STIP's and any amendments. All comments will be addressed and those responses reported to the FHWA. The revision, referred to as Revision 6 is available for public comment on the NDOR website — www.roads.nebraska.gov/STIP/index-public-comment.html — from Aug. 2-9. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Federal Transportation Administration (FTA) will not approve the revision until the public comment period has ended and comments have been evaluated and incorporated in the revision as appropriate. Copies of the Nebraska Department of Roads' STIP are available from each of the eight district offices. (See the attached map of the district offices and contact information.) Pool Closes Following Alleged Unsanitary Acts

Yankton residents hoping to take a swim at Memorial Park Pool Tuesday had their plans dumped upon by juveniles who allegedly trespassed into the facility and committed some unsanitary acts. Three juvenile males were arrested for curfew violations after officers found them swimming at the facility just after midnight early Tuesday, according to Lt. Mike Burgeson of the Yankton Police Department. Additional charges, such as trespassing, could also be filed. Todd Larson, director of the Yankton Parks and Recreation Department, said the pool was closed down Tuesday for cleaning and would re-open today (Wednesday). "There were some health concerns after the incident," he explained. Fecal matter was found in the pool. In addition, it was smeared on the deck of the pool, the concessions building and the bleachers. "This is the first time something like this has hap-

pened in our pool," Larson said. "We do have situations like this that happen in our restroom facilities where, for whatever reason, people will defecate on the floor or wipe it on walls, toilet stalls, toilets and doors, as well as urinate in trash cans, on doors, etc." The areas outside of the pool were power-washed and disinfected, he stated. "We didn't know what all they had done in the pool, so we decided to 'shock' it to be safe," Larson said. "We bring the chlorine level up over 10 parts per million to make sure we get a good kill and go from there." The city follows national standards to ensure the water is safe, and Larson said the public should have no concerns about returning to the pool. "Those things happen in pools, and it has been studied," he stated. "That's why you have chlorinated water in public pools, so you can take care of these situations."
