Minn. Man Convicted In Marty Burglary

MARTY — A Minnesota man has been sentenced in federal court on a burglary conviction tied to a Marty incident.

Raymond Jackson, 33, of White Earth, Minn., was sentenced to 15 months in custody with credit for time served, 2 years of supervised release and \$100 to the Federal Crime Victims Fund.

U.S. District Judge Karen E. Schreier sentenced Jackson Aug. 2, according to a news release from United States Attorney Brendan V. Johnson.

Jackson was indicted by a federal grand jury on Jan. 13 and pleaded guilty to the charge on May 13.

The conviction stems from an incident

that took place Aug. 15, 2012, when Jackson entered and remained in a Marty residence with the intent to commit a crime, according to the news release.

Jackson made entry into the residence by walking through an unlocked door, where he surprised the sleeping resident inside the home. The resident woke up, struggled briefly with Jackson, and Jackson ran out of the home. He was arrested a short time later.

The investigation was conducted by the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), Law Enforcement Services and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI).

The case was prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Thomas Wright.

Jackson will self-surrender to the custody of the U.S. Marshal later this month.

Beef was mixed and pork prices were lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle rose 0.30 cent to \$1.2122 a pound; August feeder cattle were fell 1.68 cents to \$1.5257 a pound; August lean hogs were lower 0.33 cent to \$1.0022 a pound.

Highway Ditch Closures Proposed

The South Dakota Department of Transportation is proposing closure to off-road vehicles on two segments of ditches near Yankton on Highways 50 and 52.

The areas that may be placed off-limits are:

- Highway 50 from Ferdig Avenue to Belair Road, from near mile marker 385 to near mile marker 388 in the north ditch.
- Highway 52 from Highway 153 to West City Limits Road, from near mile marker 338 to near mile marker 342 in both the north and south ditches.

Off-road vehicles have damaged vegetation and caused ditch erosion in those locations. The proposed closures were initiated by a local request and have the concurrence of the South Dakota Department of Transportation.

Ditch closures do not apply to snowmobiles, off-road vehicles used in normal agricultural operations and service vehicles in the line of duty for utility companies.

The South Dakota Transportation Commission will consider the proposed ditch closures at its meeting on Thursday, Aug. 22, beginning at 9 a.m. CDT in Room 200 of the Becker Hanson Building, 700 East Broadway Avenue in Pierre.
