Residential Burglary Results In 2 Arrests

Two Yankton men have been arrested in connection with a residential burglary along Chalkstone Hill. Donavon James Pinkston, 26, was arrested Friday for grand theft (more than \$1,000), third-degree burglary, possession of a substance with moderate potential for abuse and possession of drug paraphernalia. Marcus Alan Lee, 20, was arrested Friday for possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamines), receiving stolen property, possession of drug paraphernalia and possession of marijuana. According to Yankton County Sheriff Jim Vlahakis, the burglary just west of Yankton was reported at 7:30 p.m. Thursday.

A variety of tools, power lawn equipment and stereo equipment was found missing. Following an investigation, deputies executed a search warrant on a residence along Tamarack Avenue in the Timberland Park area. All of the stolen property was recovered. While executing the search warrant, items were seized that would be used for growing marijuana indoors. A small amount of marijuana and other controlled substances were also confiscated from the property.

Bridge Work To Begin Near Bloomfield Next Week

BLOOMFIELD, Neb. — Weather permitting, removal and replacement of a bridge one mile west of Bloomfield and a half-mile south of N-84 on County Road 543 Avenue is scheduled to begin the week of Aug. 12, according to the Knox County Road Department. KEA Contractors, LLC, of Milford, Neb., is the prime contractor, with a contract amount of \$608,947. A marked detour will be one mile west from the N-84/County Road 543 Avenue

junction, proceed 1 mile west on N-84, turn south on County Road 542 Avenue, travel 1 mile, then turn left and proceed back east on County Road 880, then turn right (south) back onto County Road 543 Avenue. Work is anticipated to be completed in mid-November. The Knox County Road Department's responsible charge is Kevin Barta of Center. Motorists are urged to watch for traffic signs and drive cautiously near work zone.

• A threshing crew went out on strike here at the J. H. Schumacher farm three miles southwest of Crofton on Friday afternoon. For nearly two days the bundle haulers hauling grain raised on the quarter section to the farm buildings surrounded by a dense grove suffered from the intense heat.  
• Dee Stout, prominent Lake county farmer, brought two sacks of oats containing 4 1/2 bushels which he had just harvested, to Madison and offered to exchange the oats for a 65 cent theatre ticket. Stout's offer was promptly rejected at the box office as a bad investment, as the oats sold in Madison that day for 14 cents per bushel.

Monarch Butterfly Caterpillars At The L&C Recreation Area

The Lewis & Clark Recreation Area butterfly habitat has more monarch butterfly caterpillars, according to Pam Kallis, park naturalist. "We received about 28 caterpillars from Monarch Watch and most were released into butterfly habitat," Kallis said. Staked areas of habitat that include milkweed for monarchs are found at several out of the way sites near bike paths around the park. The developing butterfly habitat and release is part of a cooperative project at the park to improve habitat conditions. For public interest, Kallis placed several monarch caterpillars among fresh milkweed in a butterfly display case at the L&C Recreation Area Welcome Center. "One caterpillar grew almost an inch in three days,"

she said. "Then he formed a silk pad to hang from. As he hung, the caterpillar outer covering split in the head/thorax region and he wiggled until the outer covering fell off and revealed this jade green chrysalis." She expects the adult butterfly in the butterfly display case will emerge from the chrysalis soon and will take about two hours for its wings to dry. "I will release it among flowers so the monarch can feed." Kallis invites the public to stop by soon at Lewis & Clark Recreation Area off Highway 52 west of Yankton to see Monarch caterpillars in development at the Welcome Center, open daily from 8:30 a.m.-1 p.m. Monarch Watch, nonprofit educational program at University of Kansas, has more information about Monarchs on its website: www.monarchwatch.org
