

Monarch Butterfly Caterpillars At The L&C Recreation Area

The Lewis & Clark Recretion Area butterfly habitat has more monarch butterfly caterpillars, according to

Pam Kallis, park naturalist. 'We received about 28 caterpillars from Monarch Watch and most were released into butterfly habitat,"

Kallis said. Staked areas of habitat that include milkweed for monarchs are found at several out of the way sites near bike paths around the park. The developing butterfly habitat and release is part of a cooperative project at the park to improve habitat con-

For public interest, Kallis placed several monarch caterpillars among fresh milkweed in a butterfly display case at the L&C Recreation Area Welcome Center.

"One caterpillar grew almost an inch in three days,'

she said. "Then he formed a silk pad to hang from. As he hung, the caterpillar outer covering split in the head /thorax region and he wiggled until the outer covering fell off and revealed this jade green chrysalis.

She expects the adult butterfly in the butterfly display case will emerge from the chrysalis soon and will take about two hours for its wings to dry. "I will release it among flowers so the monarch can

Wednesday, August 10, 1938 A threshing crew went out on strike here at the J. H. Schumacher farm three miles southwest of Crofton on Friday afternoon, For nearly two days the bundle haulers hauling grain raised on the quarter section to the farm buildings surrounded by a dense grove suffered from the intense heat.

 Dee Stout, prominent Lake county farmer, brought two sacks of oats containing 4 1/2 bushels which he had just harvested, to Madison and offered to exchange the oats for a 65 cent theatre ticket. Stout's offer was promptly rejected at the box office as a bad investment, as the oats sold in Madison that day for 14 cents per bushel.
