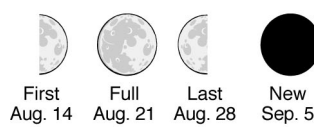

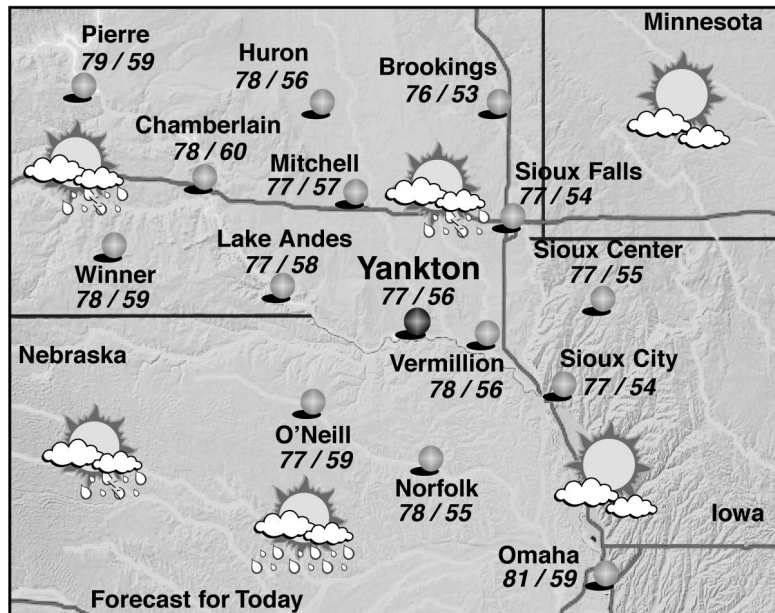

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were higher Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for December delivery was higher 1.75 cents at \$6.49 a bushel; December corn rose 10.75 cents to \$4.64 a bushel; December oats were 3.50 cents higher at \$3.3025 a bushel; while November soybeans advanced 43 cents to

\$12.2525 a bushel. Beef was mixed and pork prices were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle rose 1.10 cents to \$1.2360 a pound; August feeder cattle were lower .35 cent to \$1.5350 a pound; August lean hogs were higher 0.88 cent to \$1.0140 a pound.

right to file suits should any injuries occur.

The board tabled action on the parade revisions until its next meeting on Sept. 9. School officials said they believed a decision then would leave enough time to prepare for the parade on Sept. 27.

Yankton School District Superintendent Wayne Kindle stressed that, despite any rumors to the contrary, the parade would continue as scheduled.

"I want to be clear about something, because I think there might be some misun-

derstanding in the community. Our goal here is not to end the Pioneer Days parade," he said. "I think it's gotten around town a little bit that the parade is going to totally end, and that's not the case."

At Monday night's meeting, the school board also unanimously adopted new training rules and regulations for students participating in school activities.

YHS Activities Director Ryan Mors presented a summary of the revisions, which were made so that the district's rules would comply with current laws considering drug and alcohol use and would more closely resemble policies at other schools.

Mors said the most significant change is that the rules

now must be followed year-round. Previously, students did not face punishment if a violation occurred during the months when school was not in session or when students were between sports or activities.

"What we're looking to do is to hold our kids accountable for their actions — during seasons, between seasons and during the summer also," Mors said.

Also at the meeting, the board:

- heard a report from Kathy Wagner, director of student services, on the district's Dakota Step Test results. Wagner said YSD

performed well on the tests, with average scores for the district slightly above those throughout the state. Full reports on the results will be released in the upcoming weeks;

- heard a report from Sandy Kramer, district food service director, on the summer food service program. Kramer said the program had a successful sixth year, serving more than 200 students and approximately 12 adults each day.
