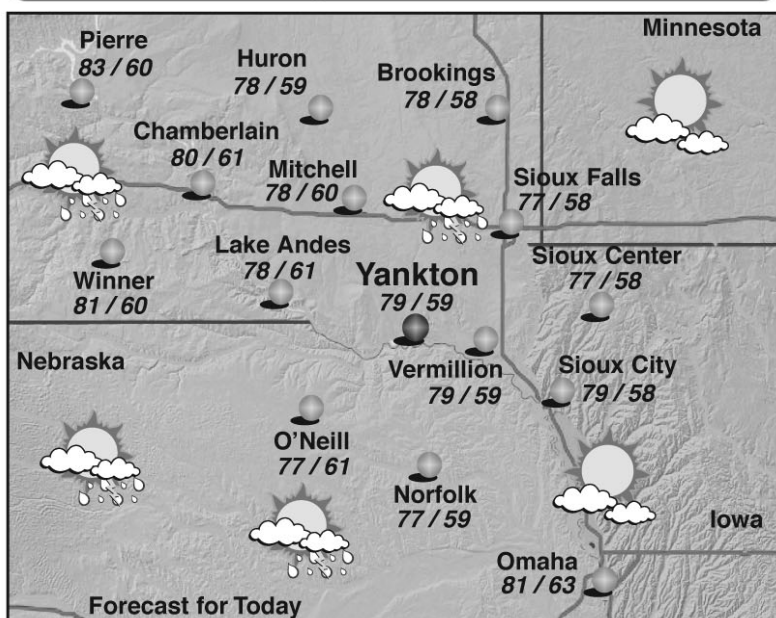

When the agenda item came up again Monday, Commissioner Dave Carda proposed that the city re-bid the property using a sealed bid process with no minimum bid set. The commission still reserves the right to not award a bid.

"I would like to get that property back into the stream of things so we can develop it," Carda said. "I think, in the long run, the city will be further ahead. We've got an appraised value. Whether or not that is a correct value, I think the bidding process will determine that. I feel comfortable that we can still do a 'yes' or 'no' vote when it comes in front of us."

A couple commissioners argued that a minimum bid should be set to avoid the disagreement that transpired last time where some felt the city should not accept less than 90 percent of the appraised value.

"There is already a number out there in the public that we didn't accept," Commissioner Craig Sommer said. "I can't imagine getting a bid higher than that this time."

When Carda's motion was put to the test, it passed on a

5-4 vote. Commissioners Pauline Akland, Charlie Gross, Sommer and Brad Woerner opposed it.

HIGHWAY 50 TO GET DECORATIVE LIGHTING

The commission also agreed this week to upgrade the lights along Highway 50, or Fourth Street.

The South Dakota Department of Transportation is set to reconstruct Highway 50 from Broadway Avenue to Burleigh Street in 2015. The following year, reconstruction will continue from Burleigh to Archery Lane. The estimated cost of the project is \$7.8 million.

With planning for that project under way, the City Commission had to decide if it wants to pay beyond what the state would pay in order to have decorative lights like those along Broadway Avenue from the Discovery Bridge to Eighth Street. Otherwise, traditional "cobra head" lights would be installed.

Staff proposed the decorative lights from Broadway to Burleigh.

"The decorative fixtures light the area," said Kevin Kuhl, director of public services for Yankton. "Cobra heads just light the pavement surface in front of the cars."

The cost to the city for decorative lights along the proposed stretch is \$268,000. The cobra head lights for the

USD Student Wins Fraternity Award

VERMILLION — Tyler Tordsen, an undergraduate brother from the Alpha-Gamma chapter of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity at the University of South Dakota, received the 2013 Cyril F. "Duke" Flad Outstanding Undergraduate Award at the Fraternity's annual Stead Leadership Seminar held in Memphis, Tenn. last month.

The award was created in 1970 to honor Flad and was presented to Tordsen by Jim Schrader, a member of the board of Lambda Chi Alpha. One outstanding undergraduate from among all student members is selected annually

same area would be \$12,000. Also, the additional cost in power and maintenance of the decorative lights compared to the cobra head lights is estimated at \$730 per month.

"Why does the city need to go from Broadway to Burleigh with the decorative lights?" Gross asked. "It seems to me that, by the time we get to Douglas Avenue or Capital Street, we're through the downtown area."

Kuhl said that is an option.

"The thought was to create a transition into the downtown area and calm the traffic," City Manager Amy Nelson added. "Lighting is one way to do that. (The decorative lights) are expensive, but this is something we're probably going to do once and not again."

The commission was also asked if it wanted to invest an additional \$14,500 in the cobra head lights from Burleigh east so they could have LED fixtures.

"Over the life of the fixtures, we will recover that cost," Kuhl said, noting they consume less energy and re-

quire less maintenance than the standard fixtures.

The decorative lighting from Broadway to Burleigh, as well as the LED fixtures from Burleigh east, was approved in a 7-2 vote. Commissioners Jake Hoffner and Woerner opposed it.

In other business this week, the commission approved an ordinance that updates Yankton to the 2009 International Fire Code and includes a requirement for lock boxes to be installed in all existing and new commercial, multi-family and educational buildings equipped with, or required to be equipped with, fire protection systems, or where security restricts lifesaving or firefighting operations. More than 100 properties within the city, in addition to some outside the community, have already voluntarily purchased lock boxes, according to Yankton Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles. He estimated the lock box requirement will affect 500 additional buildings.
