School District Is 6th In State To Challenge Performance Scores

PIERRE — The count is now six districts appealing their latest school performance scores from the state Department of Education.

Vermillion is the latest and perhaps final. The deadline for appeals was 5 p.m. Thursday. Five came earlier from Tea, Corsica, Dakota Valley, Rapid City and Sioux Falls.

A state official said she came across Vermillion's appeal Thursday evening as she was leaving work for the day.

"The majority have to do with summer graduates," said Mary Stadick Smith, a spokeswoman for the department.

She declined to provide further specifics because state and federal regulations prohibit releasing some information when student groups are too small in number.

The scores are calculated before summer class work concludes and graduation

discrepancies weren't a surprise. "That happens every year, so there's nothing unusual in that," she said.


The scores this summer are the first using the department's new performance-index system as a replacement for the No Child Left Behind approach of the past

Last summer there were eight appeals. There were 23 appeals in each of the two prior years.

During an inservice prior to school starting next week, Yankton School District teachers learned Friday about the labor of others in the community.

Approximately 240 teachers visited two businesses each Friday

morning via a dozen school buses. "It's an opportunity for us to get out into the community as educators and see what happens out there," Superintendent Dr. Wayne Kindle stated. "We hit most of the manufacturing groups in town, and it was a real eye-opener for me. I didn't realize some of the things we're doing right here in Yankton.'


