



Area Employees Not Affected By Wells Fargo Layoffs

Yankton's Wells Fargo offices will not be affected by the 2,323 nationwide layoffs the bank announced Wednesday.

According to Wells Fargo spokeswoman Staci Schiller, the company is making the cuts to its mortgage refinancing departments in response to higher interest rates.

"The volume for mortgage refinancing has lessened, and we had staffed up to meet that need," she said. "Now that interest rates are higher, we're still seeing volume for new loans, but people aren't looking to refinance their existing mortgage."

While the Wells Fargo offices in Yankton have at least one employee that works in mortgage consulting, there aren't any individuals that work strictly with mortgage refinancing, Schiller said. Therefore, none of the 21 employees in the county were affected, she said.

Added Wells Fargo Community Bank president Larry Young, "I don't see any change in business here in Yankton. Our mortgage rep position is here to stay, and so is our commitment to the community."

Construction will continue into October.

Wheat for December delivery rose 3.25 cents to \$6.4925 a bushel; December corn rose 7.75 cents to \$4.8325 a bushel; December oats were 1.75 cents higher at \$3.36 a bushel; while November soybeans advanced 13.50 cents to \$13.04 a bushel.
