

— Territorial Capitol replica, Yankton Riverside Park, 10 a.m.-4 p.m.: Lewis & Clark Exhibit — A ranger displays replicas of articles used by the Lewis & Clark Expedition over 200 years ago, and explains their uses and how they contributed to the success of the expedition.
- Niobrara State Park, RV Campground, 7 p.m.: "Standing Bear vs. the Indian Ring" — This living history reenactment portrays Thomas Henry Tibbles, former abolitionist fighter, preacher, and 1879 editor of the *Omaha Herald* who helped Chief Standing Bear and the Ponca Tribe bring suit against the United States government. This presentation is the type of speech Tibbles may have made on speaking tours of the Eastern states from 1879 to 1883 to raise awareness of what he perceived as a conspiracy against American Indians.
- **Saturday, Aug 24**  
— Ponca State Park, Ponce, Neb., 8 a.m.-5 p.m.: Lewis & Clark Heritage Day — Travel with the Corps of Discovery through multiple presentations, exhibits, and reenactments by the National Park Service, Nebraska State Parks, and others.

— Lewis & Clark Visitor Center at Gavins Point Dam: 11 a.m.-1 p.m.: Ranger's Choice program — Let the ranger surprise you with a special exhibit or kids' activity.

• President Roosevelt approved today the names for eight new warships. The summer white house announced that the next four battleships to be laid down will be christened the Indiana, Massachusetts, Alabama and South Dakota.

**Friday, August 23, 1963**  
• Derailment of 20 cars of a Milwaukee road freight one mile south of here (Bridgewater) left the railroad today with a two-to-three day cleanup job. Twelve of the cars flipped over and were badly damaged. Track was torn up for 400

feet and damaged for more than one-half mile. McCook county sheriff Harold Lockwood said cause of the derailment about 4:30 p.m. Thursday was not determined.

- The *Plain Talk* Publishers, Inc., of Vermillion, a newspaper publishing firm, filed articles of incorporation today. The firm was capitalized at \$100,000 and listed directors William S., Lois James and N. L. Gibson, all of Vermillion.

**Tuesday, August 23, 1988**  
• The harvest of major crops in South Dakota will be reduced by one-third to two-thirds by the 1988 drought, resulting in the worst harvest in 50 years for some grains, the Agricultural Statistics Service said Monday. South Dakota, the nation's No. 1 oats producing state, will harvest only 17.6 million bushels of that crop, the smallest production since 1936 and a reduction of 67 percent from last year.
