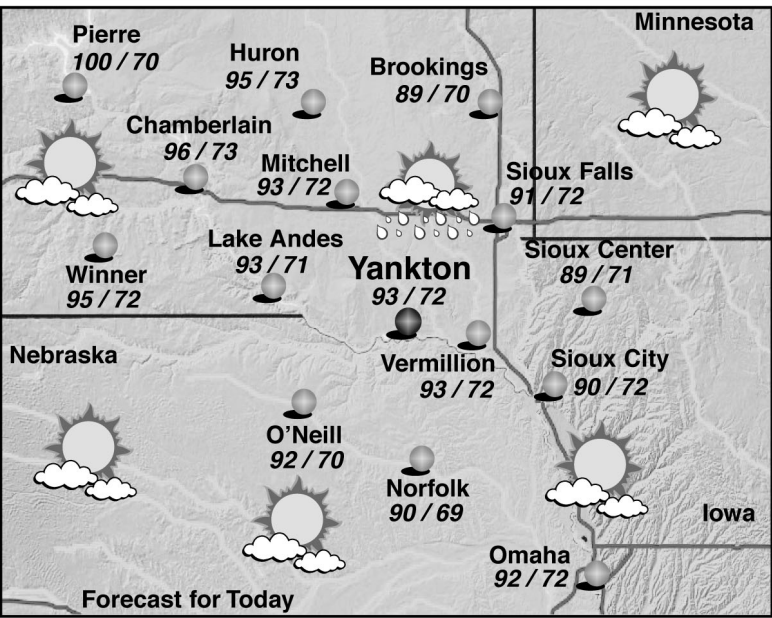

Food Assistance Grants Available

LAKE ANDES — The Rural Office of Community Services, Inc. (ROCS) has been awarded Emergency Food Assistance (EFA) Grant funding from the State of South Dakota.
The Grant allows ROCS to sub-grant funding to established food pantries located within the 20 county ROCS service area. Counties included in the service area are: Aurora, Brule, Buffalo, Bon Homme, Clay, Charles Mix, Douglas, Davison, Gregory, Hanson, Hutchinson, Lyman, Jerauld, Jones, Mellette, Sanborn, Tripp, Todd, Union and Yankton. This funding can only be used to purchase food (no personal care items) to stock food pantry shelves.
This is the second year of a three year granting program. Prior grantees must reapply for funding.
In order to qualify to apply for these funds, Food Pantries must be located and operate within the ROCS service area. Food Pantries must report the number of individuals and households assisted on a monthly basis when distributing food purchased with EFA funding. Food Pantries must have applicants fill out an application for assistance. Application forms must be a) form provided by ROCS or b) approved local client information form. Pantries must have clients fill out the form (1) one time during the grant period.
Requests for funding must be made in writing with the following information. A short narrative (1-2 paragraphs) describing the needs of the food pantry, location of the pantry, contact person in charge of the pantry (name, phone number, mailing address and/or email address for pantry correspondence), dollar amount requested and preferred vendor (such as Feeding SD, local grocery store, etc.)

City To Discuss Possible Changes In Animal Ordinance

The Yankton City Commission will discuss updating the city's animal ordinance during its meeting Monday night.
During a media briefing held Friday, City Manager Amy Nelson and City Commissioner Jake Hoffner said there were "discrepancies" in the current code that do not cover a number of issues, such as exotic animals. Nelson said Monday's discussion will likely lead to a work session for the commissioners, with possible changes coming forth that would be subject to public hearings down the line.
Also Monday, commissioners will continue a rate increase and a change in weekend hours for the Summit Activities Center, set a date for the second reading of the proposed city budget, consider a rezoning request along West City Limits Road, hold several public hearings for special events liquor licenses and hold a public hearing for a liquor license transfer.
The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Monday at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mostly higher Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for December delivery rose 5.50 cents to \$6.46 a bushel; December corn rose 5.50 cents to \$4.70 a bushel; December oats were 1.00 cent lower at \$3.3150 a bushel; while November soybeans advanced 41.25 cents to \$13.28 a bushel.
Beef was lower and pork prices were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
October live cattle fell .50 cent to \$1.2670 a pound; September feeder cattle was 1.05 cents lower at \$1.5665 a pound; while October lean hogs were .70 cent higher at \$.8510 a pound.

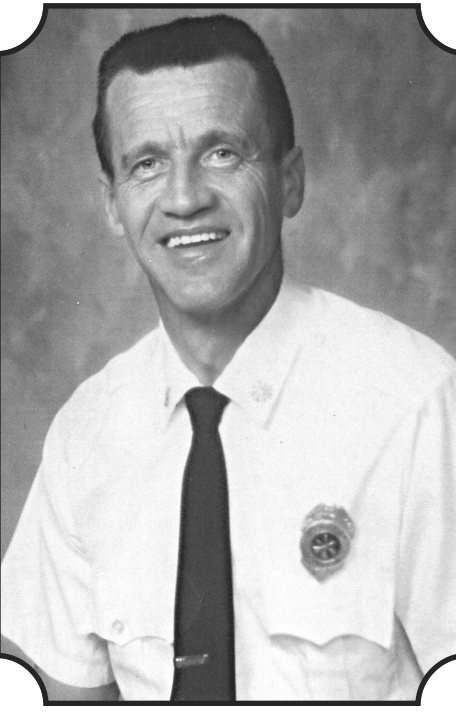
