VERMILLION — What do double overtime losses feel

"It feels like a loss," USD soccer head coach Mandy Green said simply after her team played Loyola University (Ĉhicago) to a 1-1 tie in Friday's season opener for both teams.

Especially to not come out on top, given how much soccer was played. The total? 110 minutes. The combined output? 30 shots, 7 on goal.

That's a lot of running,' sophomore midfielder Rebecca Sparkman said. "It definitely keeps you in shape.'

It didn't however, result in a victory for the Coyotes (0-0-1), despite several chances.

USD got on the scoreboard in the 31st minute of the first half, when sophomore Teagen Eberle's corner kick found Sparkman who punched the ball in.

For the next 38 minutes, the Coyotes held on to that lead. But a sluggish stretch in the second period allowed Loyola to score on a Tricia Stonebraker shot in the 79th

The first 10-minute overtime period was scoreless, as was the second 10-minute period. USD, did however, save a potential Loyola goal with 2:07 left in the second overtime, when junior Colleen

Rash Of Injuries Testing Coyotes' Depth

VERMILLION — With injuries already piling up a full week before the season opener, the USD football team is relying even more on its

Injuries have already taken their toll on the running backs, receivers and linebackers, and though the defensive line has been mostly spared, the Coyotes are moving on.

'You just can't dwell on it, you have to move forward and hope they deal with it," head coach Joe Glenn said after Friday's practice. "The only thing you can do is pray for them and trust the next guy coming in."

Or in the case of Adam Praska and Jon Maag, the

next guys switching sides.

Praska, a junior, and Maag, a true freshman, recently made the switch from offensive line to the defensive line, to help a unit that needs

depth.
"When they asked me to move, I thought, 'I've been on the d-line since I got here, but hey, let's get over there and help out," Praska said Friday.

Maag's experience on both sides of the ball is more recent, but even that came at the high school level — far. he said, from the grind of an FCS fall camp.

"I was recruited as an offensive lineman, but I played both in high school. So I'm not brand new, at least," Maag said. "I'll play wherever they need me."

Depth-wise, the Coyotes needed some help.

USD returns four players with experience on the defensive line — Kenny Greer (Jr., 21 games, 4 starts), Emilious Davis (Sr. transfer, 11 games, 3 starts), Nick Jacobs (So., 11 games, 8 starts) and Drew Iddings (So., 11 games, 3

starts). Other than that, USD has three true freshmen and three redshirt freshmen on

the defensive line. "They brought me over to make plays, to blow things up," Praska said.

Praska, a 6-foot-4, 310pound native of Elma, Iowa, played a total of 10 games at offensive line — including nine last season.

"Those are good moves for us." Glenn said. "Praska will definitely help us. He's 310 pounds and stronger than an ox; you can't knock him.

"He's already got a good

push in there.' In the case of Maag, a 6foot-4, 255-pound native of Scottsbluff, Neb., he was a two-way player in high school. USD is still deciding whether to play him as a true

freshman, Glenn said. "He had 100 tackles at defensive line in high school. and he started on offense too," Glenn said. "So that shows you what kind of motor he has.'

Those motors have needed tweaking in the switch, Praska said. Namely, the stance — which is more stretched out on the defensive line.

"When you're on offense, you take a small step back to get more leverage and then get vertical," Praska said. "On defense, you're going straight

ahead with more aggression." Such a change naturally

takes some time, Maag said. "My mind was completely on offense, so it was a slow adjustment," he said. They've been teaching me the proper techniques; high school was different.

Friday marked the seventh practice since Praska was moved, and though USD has a week before the Aug. 31 season opener against UC Davis, the adjustment has progressed, he said.

The first few days were pretty slow, because I didn't exactly know what I was doing," Praska said. "But I think I've caught on fast."

Official Warns Of Hitch On Vikes Stadium MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — The

public authority overseeing construction of a new Minnesota Vikings stadium warned Friday that the opening could be delayed if the team doesn't quickly resume negotiations on lease and development agreements.

Minnesota Sports Facilities Authority chairwoman Michele Kelm-Helgen said the team unexpectedly broke off negotiations a day earlier, saying it wanted to wait until a review was completed on its ability to finance its \$477 million share of the nearly billiondollar stadium.

Kelm-Helgen said the agreements need to be in place by Sept. 15 to avoid delays. The project timeline calls for breaking ground on the taxpayer-subsidized stadium on Nov. 7 and completing it ahead of the 2016 football season.

Kelm-Helgen wouldn't identify the major issues separating the two sides on the agreements, calling them "substantial" but well within reach. At the authority's regular meeting Friday, she said it was a surprise when the Vikings broke off talks. Delay in those agreements would delay the team's financing and eventually a

struction) schedule could be in jeopardy," Kelm-Helgen said. That could eventually mean cost overruns for taxpayers. Vikings spokesman Lester

Bagley said the team was confident the stadium would stay on schedule. But he said the due diligence review was having a negative effect on the talks, an allusion to the closer examination of owners Zygi and Mark Wilf's family finances after a New Jersey judge found they had defrauded a business partner in a past development deal. Gov. Mark Dayton has said his confidence in the Wilfs was shaken and said an audit was necessary before the public commits \$498 million of taxpayer

"We can't have partnership negotiations when we're not at the table as partners," Bagley said.

The New Jersey judge is expected to rule soon on the damages the Wilfs will have to pay. But Bagley said again Friday the lawsuit "will have absolutely no impact" on their ability to pay their share of the stadium.

Bagley said the team has provided detailed financial information for the authority and arranged meetings involving the NFL and several banks, including U.S. Bank.

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
