



County Accepts Storage Facility Bid

The Yankton County Commission decided Friday to move ahead with construction of a cold storage facility.

During a special meeting, the commission accepted a bid of \$122,625 from James Steel to construct the facility on the west side of the county ambulance facility at 805 Capital Street. Commissioner Garry Moore, who has consistently argued against the project, cast the sole dissenting vote.

The acceptance of the bid is contingent upon final approval of a budget supplement of \$122,625 to the Emergency Management fund. The hearing for the supplement will be held in September.

The commission had put off accepting the bid at a meeting earlier in the week so Auditor Patty Hojem could determine from where in the county budget the funds for the building project could be transferred.

Gavins Point Dam Tours Set

There will be no tours of the Gavins Point Power plant, located near Yankton, on Friday, Aug. 30.

by current legal standards. When violations have been taken to magistrate court, Hosmer said the judge has had a difficult time interpreting a lot of the ordinances

Furthermore, loopholes exist, he added.

"We would have leash violations where people would say, 'I don't own the animal. I was just walking the animal," Hosmer said. "Our leash ordinance only says the owner of the animal.

City staff hopes the proposed ordinance will lead to a final version that provides clarity to citizens.

Some of the issues addressed are the definition of an angry or aggressive dog, defining the number of dogs/animals allowed per household and a process to declare an animal dangerous.

Hosmer said one of the issues that worries him most are nuisance violations that are indicative of other problems.

"Probably seven or eight times since Åpril 1, 2009 (when I began as city attorney), we've had instances where people have had an excessive number of pets," he stated, "In some of the instances, they are not pets. They're strays and they're feeding them. We don't have anything that prohibits that. As a result, the only way we were getting in is if we would say the

animal wasn't licensed.' Authorities could then get a warrant to search the residence, which would lead to the discovery that the home was uninhabitable or had poor conditions.

"In no instances did I file any charges for abuse or neglect of an animal," Hosmer said. "In all instances, it's a person who is exercising poor judgment. They didn't need anymore attention brought to them. They needed to make sure someone was caring for them.'

The help of social services and mental health experts was sought to assist the individuals.

This framework provides more opportunity and more

statutory foundation upon which these nuisance actions can be brought," Hosmer said.

He said the review of the current laws and devising new ones has been an enjoyable experience that has been informed by reviewing the ordinances of other large cities in South Dakota.

"I would encourage you to mull (the proposed ordinance) over some more because you may want to pull certain portions out of it and debate it at a different time because they are policy decisions," Hosmer stated.

In other business, the commission opted to increase the rates for use of the Summit Activities Center and adjust its operating hours.

The last rate increase occurred in March 2011.

Under the new structure, which goes into effect Dec. 1, an annual family membership will go from \$504 to \$516; an adult couple membership will

go from \$420 to \$432; a senior citizen couple membership will go from \$348 to \$372; an single adult membership will go from \$288 to \$312; a single senior citizen or college student membership will go from \$240 to \$264; and a high school/vouth membership will go from \$120 to \$144.

Beginning Sept. 3, the Summit Activities Center will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Saturdays, rather than 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. On Sundays, it will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m., rather than from noon to 9 p.m.

Also Monday, the commission recognized Officer Rob Buechler, Officer Monty Rothenberger, Corporal Brad Parker and Officer Jeremy McNinch for their roles in saving a woman from drowning in the Missouri River in July.


