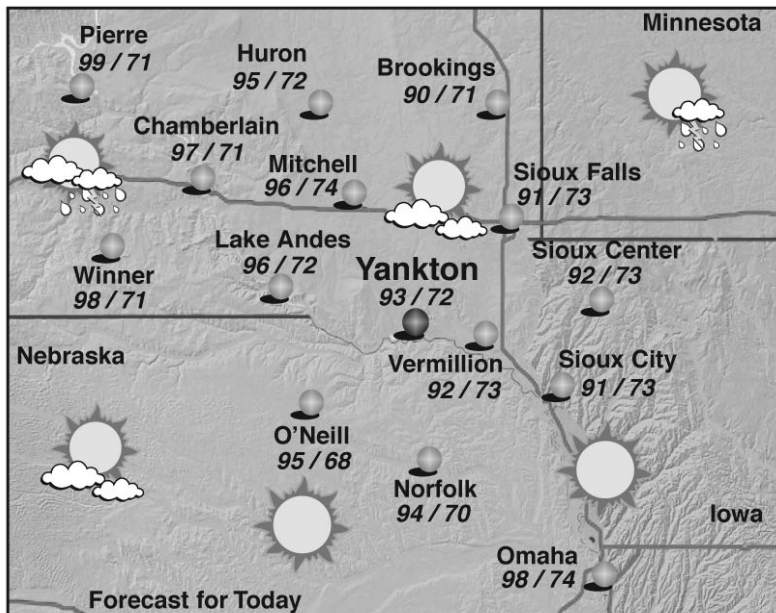

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mostly lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery fell 3 cents to \$6.6375 a bushel; December corn fell 14.25 cents to \$4.8625 a bushel; December oats were 5 cents higher at \$3.4975 a bushel; while November soybeans declined 19 cents to \$13.7050 a bushel.

Beef was mixed and pork prices were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle fell .43 cent to \$1.2672 a pound; October feeder cattle was 1.10 cents higher at \$1.5695 a pound; while October lean hogs were .55 cent higher at \$8.657 a pound.

Kindle said he does not yet have an estimate on the cost to fix the damaged windows.

Lt. Todd Brandt of the Yankton Police Department said both cases remain under investigation.

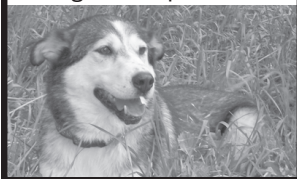

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Heat Advisory Continues This Week

The dog days of summer will continue barking the rest of this week.

National Weather Service (NWS) meteorologist Todd Heitkamp of Sioux Falls warned on Twitter that the heat index was at a "dangerous" level and would continue today (Wednesday). "Hopefully, everyone is keeping themselves and their pets hydrated!" Heitkamp tweeted.

The NWS has extended its heat advisory for southeast South Dakota until 7 p.m. today. However, the NWS has forecast that the daytime heat index will remain in the 105-degree range through Saturday.

A Sioux Falls television station reported that the heat index reached 110 degrees Tuesday in southeast South Dakota. Yankton's temperature remained near 90 degrees as of 9 p.m. Tuesday.

The NWS has already said that South Dakota may be in the midst of the warmest final week of August on record for the state.

The heat advisory has been lifted for much of northeast Nebraska, including Knox and Cedar counties. However, the NWS has forecast that the heat index could remain around 100 degrees through Saturday.

The NWS has reiterated its "Beat the Heat, Check the Backseat" message against leaving children or pets in a closed car for any amount of time.

Since 1998, at least 532 children have died nationwide from being left in a hot

car. The inside of a car acts like a greenhouse, where actual temperatures inside the vehicle can reach 120°F in minutes and approach 150°F in as little as an hour.

This can cause heat stroke in only minutes, particularly in children, whose body temperatures warm at a rate three to five times faster than an adult. Studies have shown that "cracking the windows" provides little, if any, relief.

The continued heat wave has resulted in early dismissals for a number of schools. Some districts have already announced plans for the rest of the week.

The high heat and humidity have also raised concern among officials with the South Dakota High School Activities Association (SDHSAA) and the Nebraska School Activities Association (NSAA). Both bodies have reiterated their guidelines for heat and hydration.

SDHSAA Assistant Executive Director Jo Auch was conducting regional meetings across the state Monday, and she sent out an email Tuesday morning to all athletic directors, head volleyball coaches and volleyball officials.

Auch provided the Press & Dakotan with the email. She offered options for consideration by volleyball officials.

"Although there are not any 'additional' time-outs throughout the match, there is an allowance for extra time between sets. The SDHSAA rules call for the allowance and adjustments to the amount of time between sets as related to heat," she said.

"I would encourage our coaches to utilize their time-

outs throughout the course of the match. Each head coach is entitled to two time-outs during each set played. With the extreme heat predicted and non-air conditioned gymnasiums, it may be best to utilize your time-outs throughout each set."

Auch also asked officials to consider appropriate action.

"Officials, please consider utilizing this heat-related format for contests that are being played in less than favorable conditions, as the health and safety of our student athletes is always our top priority," she said.

"Officials should discuss with coaches and captains at the pre-match conference the possibility of extending the time between sets to four minutes rather than the three allowable minutes, due to the extreme heat. If in doubt, take the heat time-out!"

Officials may also need to deal with a slippery floor due to condensation, Auch said.

If conditions are unbearable, the time between sets within the match may be extended from three minutes to

four minutes. The officials and the coaches shall make this decision. If there is a disagreement as to taking extra time or not, the final decision rests with the match officials.

In the event that moisture condenses on the floor, it shall be the decision of the first referee to stop the match whenever he/she deems conditions are no longer safe to continue. The first referee may confer with the second referee in this regard.

Once a decision has been made by the officials to stop the match, based upon mutual agreement of both schools, three options can be considered. Those options include resuming play at a later date, declaring a winner or canceling the match if a replacement date cannot be scheduled.

"With the forecast as such for the remainder of the week, and the opening contests this weekend, please take the time to ensure the safety of our student athletes," she wrote.
