2013 Nikki's Fund 5K Run/Walk Set For Sept. 14

VERMILLION — The eighth annual Nikki's Fund 5K Run/Walk will be held on Saturday, Sept. 14 at Prentis Park in Vermillion. Nikki's Fund and the University of South Dakota along with the communities of Vermillion and Yankton have sponsored this event since 2006 as part of National Suicide Prevention Week activities in September. The 5K raises money for USD students in crisis situations and helps promote suicide prevention awareness throughout the campus community.

"USD, Vermillion and Yankton are wonderful supporters of Nikki's Fund. Since its inception in 2006, we've raised more than \$30,000 for USD students," said Janine Harris, founder of Nikki's

Fund, which was created in memory of her daughter, Nicole Vallie Harris, who died from suicide on June 15, 2005. "Suicide is a preventable public health problem and prevention begins with each and every one of us. Our mission is educating others that suicide is not an option, that getting the help they need and deserve is."

Registration forms are available now at the Student Counseling Center, which is located at the Cook House on the USD campus and at the Muenster University Center at USD. Participants can also register online at AllSport Central (www.allsportcentral.com) or complete a form the day of the run at 8 a.m. at Prentis Park.

All proceeds go toward Nikki's Fund to support suicide prevention programs and other mental health needs for USD students.

The 2013 race/walk starts at 9 a.m. at Prentis Park (also the finish site). The route takes runners and walkers on a route through downtown Vermillion. Prizes are awarded to first place finishers in the male and female categories of 15 and under, 16 to 25 years old, 26 to 54 years old, and 55 and over. T-shirts and refreshments will also be provided.

Living History Reenactment To Be Held

Missouri National Recreational River, southeast South Dakota's and northeast Nebraska's only National Park, will present "Standing Bear vs. the Indian Ring" at 3 p.m. Friday, Aug. 30, at the Corps of Engineers Lewis & Clark Visitor Center at Gavins Point Dam.

This living history reenactment portrays Thomas Henry Tibbles, former abolitionist fighter, preacher, and 1879 editor of the *Omaha Herald* who helped Chief Standing Bear and the Ponca Tribe bring suit against the United States government.

This presentation is the type of speech Tibbles may have made on speaking tours of the Eastern states from 1879 to 1883. He made numerous rounds of the lecture circuit to raise awareness of what he perceived as a conspiracy against American Indians. On some of these tours, he was accompanied by Chief Standing Bear and Suzette "Bright Eyes" Laflesche whom he married in 1882.

ST. LOUIS — AAA South Dakota will offer its Topsy Tow community service program for Labor Day weekend again this year. The innovative service gives intoxicated drivers an option to getting behind the wheel and taking a chance while impaired. Anyone, AAA member or not, can call for a free Topsy Tow ride for themselves and their vehicle, from 6 p.m. Aug. 30 to 4 a.m. Sept. 3.

Topsy Tow is available in Sioux Falls, Rapid City, Mitchell and Yankton at no charge, no questions asked.

"This program is effective because it brings attention to the dangers of drinking and driving beyond just giving an intoxicated driver a safe ride home," said Marilyn Buskohl, spokeswoman for AAA South Dakota. "Hopefully we're promoting not just Topsy Tow but also the use of designated drivers and a caring attitude among drivers across South Dakota."

Topsy Tow offers a confidential local ride within a 15-mile radius to the driver's home. The AAA service vehicle takes the driver and up to one more person, and their car, home.

South Dakota motorists should call 800-AAA-HELP (800-222-4357) and make sure they ask for Topsy Tow. AAA will do the rest.
