Superintendent's Compendium, Missouri National Recreational River

The National Park Service (NPS) recently updated the Superintendent's Compendium for the Missouri National Recreational River to include an immediate ban on the use of unmanned aircraft within the jurisdictional boundaries of the Park. The ban is compliant with a Service-wide policy memorandum (14-05) issued by the Director of the National Park Service dated June 19, 2014. The Superintendent's Compendium is a document containing park-specific regulations based on the superintendent's authority under 36 Code of Regulations (C.F.R.) 1.5 to close all or a portion of a park or otherwise limit an activity to maintain public health and safety, protect environmental or scenic values, protect natural or cultural resources, implement management responsibilities, equitably allocate and use facilities, or avoid conflict among visitor activities. Other components of the Superintendent's Compendium that may be of interest to communities adjacent to Missouri National Recreational River boundaries from Fort Randall Dam to Ponca State Park, excluding Lewis and Clark Lake and the Gavins Point Dam area, include:

- 36 C.F.R. 1.6 pertaining to activities that require a permit to be issued by the Park:
- §2.5 (a) Specimens collection (Take plant, fish, wildlife, rocks or minerals) – Removal of wildlife for purposes other than those under legal hunting, fishing or trapping as regulated through Nebraska and South Dakota state laws and regulations.
- §2.50 (a) Conduct a sports event, pageant, regatta, public spectator attraction, entertainment, ceremony, and similar special use events.
- 36 C.F.R. Part 3 pertaining to boating and water use activities:
- §3.8 (a) (1) Launching or operating an air-boat is prohibited
- §3.9 (a) Launching or operating personal watercraft ("jet ski") is prohibited

situation surrounding the master's program doesn't affect the college's other nursing programs. College officials say they are reassuring current and prospective students of the accreditation for the Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) or Master of Science in Nurse Anesthesia (MSNA) programs.

"The BSN has accreditation through June 2022," Tacke said. The CCNE issued a statement this week regarding the status of Mount Marty's MSN program. The CCNE had determined Mount Marty's MSN program met the standards for mission and effectiveness as well as aggregate student and faculty outcomes. However, it was determined the college didn't meet standards for resources, curriculum and teaching-learning practices.

The effective date of the CCNE action was April 25. A program that has accreditation withdrawn or denied cannot submit a new application for CCNE accreditation for a minimum of six months.

MMC withdrew its appeal of CCNE's decision. However, the college did take the opportunity offered to submit official comments. CCNE officials said they recently received those comments.

Susan Kalsow, the MMC vice president and dean for academic affairs, said in the letter to CCNE officials that the college has taken steps to address the accrediting agency's concerns.

"We understand that some of CCNE's prior concerns related to leadership and resource issues. Mount Marty has had some leadership changes lately," she said. "With the resignation of Chief Nursing Administrator Shelly Luger and the upcoming retirement of MSN Director Dr. Jaqueline Kelly, Mount Marty recognizes that this is the time to take a fresh look at the MSN program."

In her letter, Kalsow also referred to MMC's new leadership under Lorang and his commitment to making needed changes in the nursing department.

"Our new interim president, Dr. Thomas Lorang, understands the issues facing the MSN program and has already participated in a discussion with the South Dakota Board of Nursing to receive that board's input and suggestions," she said. "Dr. Lorang is committed to use his position to create an exemplary MSN program. I share his vision for the program and am similarly committed to the process."

As part of that commitment, MMC has created a new position of associate dean for academic affairs, Kalsow said. Dr. Lisa Bonneau is currently serving in that position, which includes overall assessment, Higher Learning Commission liaison, dual credit coordinator and accreditation.

Bonneau will act as a key leader in future accreditation and assessment for the MSN program, Kalsow said. In that role, Bonneau will coordinate assessment activities and review accreditation documents before submission.

In addition, Bonneau will develop a program that evaluates Mount Marty's MSN program and its mission, goals and outcomes.

In her letter, Kalsow also addressed the CCNE concerns about adequate resources for the MSN program.

"Mount Marty remains committed to appropriately supporting the program with the adequate fiscal and staffing needs," she wrote.

As part of that effort, MMC recently hired a consultant to assist with the re-application process for CCNE Kalsow said.

"We anticipate that the consultant's expertise will aid in the structuring of the program going forward as well as assisting the college in addressing deficiencies identified during this accreditation process," she said.

"We also hired a new full-time clinical coordinator to assist with MSN student evaluation and are visiting with other colleges in the region to determine the feasibility of partnerships to benefit all parties involved."

Even before CCNE's official denial of accreditation, Mount Marty had begun addressing concerns about resources, Kalsow said.

"Meeting rooms and offices for the MSN program will be made available ... at Avera Sacred Heart Hospital, a facility adjacent to the college's main campus in Yankton," she wrote. "This move will more than afford the program the space needed to operate efficiently while giving the students a common learning environment. This move also opens doors for more collaboration with Avera in terms of programs and support."

The MSN program will remain focused at the hospital and won't use the facilities of the new Avera Science and Nursing Complex, scheduled to open this fall on campus, Tacke said.

In addition, MMC has used the CCNE evaluation to make organizational changes benefiting, among other things, catalog and website updates, Kalsow said.

MMC officials remain confident the master's program will gain its initial accreditation, Kalsow said.

"Mount Marty's administration and nursing faculty are working diligently to resolve the issues identified by CCNE," she said.

"Mount Marty will work in conjunction with CCNE going forward and expects a successful accreditation for the MSN program in the future."

Johnson and Moss, both of whom live in Memphis, Tennessee, are each listed as defendants in the museum's complaint.

Moss had the opportunity to buy the guitar in 2007 but did not pay for it in full, Johnson told the Associated Press Thursday.

"Since Larry Moss never paid for the guitar, I had the right to donate the guitar." A payment agreement dated in 2008 shows that Moss agreed to pay Johnson \$120,000 for various guitars including the one in dispute. The agreement is part of the exhibits filed in a libel and defamation lawsuit that Johnson initiated against Moss in state court in Tennessee in January.

The court records also include a check Moss wrote to Johnson for \$70,000 in connection with the payment agreement, as well as an email Moss sent to the museum in December 2013 claiming ownership.

Federal court records show Johnson has not responded to the lawsuit in South Dakota as of Thursday. Johnson's attorney did not

return a call seeking comment Thursday.

In court filings, the museum argues that even if Moss was the owner of the Elvis guitar before Johnson donated it to the facility, his ownership ended when the museum acquired it. The complaint states that if Moss feels he was wronged, he should sue Johnson for damages.

"Johnson had possession and control of the guitar apparently for many years during which time Moss purports to have been the owner of the guitar, yet Moss took no action to assert his alleged rights in the guitar," the museum's attorney, Mitchell Peterson, wrote in the complaint.

On loan from Johnson, the broken instrument was on display for about two years beginning in late 2008 at the Memphis Rock 'n' Soul Museum.

Johnson, who played with singer Isaac Hayes and the band John Entwistle's Ox in the 1970s, donated the Elvis guitar and other items to the museum in April 2013. At the same time, he received \$250,000 for his 1967 Gibson Explorer Korina wood guitar, formerly owned by Entwistle, who is best known as a member of The Who.

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
