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for tournaments of this size larger ones, especially next year's 2015 Youth World Championship — will require more work.

'The tournament that we

have going on right now, we have to have the logistical ability to handle 500-800 people," he said. "We've got that with things like a comfort station, parking and all the little things we've had to work on. For next year's tournament, we're going to double that in total people, so it really isn't anything more that the center needs it's probably more what

we need from a community standpoint. We need places for people to stay, places for people to eat and a good diversity of that.'

Motel space is one of the major needs in the area.

Stephanie Moser, director of the Yankton Convention and Visitors Bureau, said the issue has necessitated that alternatives be assessed for the amount of people set to come to town.

'We are short hotel rooms," Moser said. "As we planned for the World Youth Archery Tournament, we did need to get a little creative on where we could potentially put all the archers and spectators that are coming for that tournament."

Nancy Wenande, event manager for the 2015 Youth World Championship, said the lodging plan is pretty

'We've secured the majority of the room blocks

that we need for next year," Wenande said. "We are utilizing the Lewis & Clark Lodge and their hotel and their cabins, as well as several of the hotels here in town. We're also utilizing Mount Marty College — they have 289 beds that we will be able to use for the archers coming in and the support staff. We could also have up to 400 beds available at USD should we need to look outside of Yankton to fulfill the housing needs. As of right now, I think we will be good to go on housing."

Moser added the hotel space has made it somewhat difficult for the city to attract other ventures beyond archery.

"It's really difficult for Yankton to bid larger state conventions because we're real limited on space," she said. "The type of housing space available and meeting space available really limits what we can bring to Yankton. And if we really want to try and attract a larger

event, that's something

Currently, the city has 432 hotel rooms with 59 more set to be added when the new EconoLodge opens near the Yankton Mall this fall.

we're going to need to think

Cull said one thing that makes it difficult to bring in more hotel space is the city's tendency to be more of a summer destination.

"One of the big issues that we have being a big tourist town is that a huge percentage of our visitors are here between Memorial Day and Labor Day," he said. "Hotels look at occupancy ... Our occupancy rates are — 90 percent, plus — from Memorial Day to Labor Day, but from Labor Day to Memorial Day, they get down below the kind of numbers that they need.

He added the archery complex has tried to do some work filling that gap.

"It's just a growing pain that we have and we have to really look at attracting different events to the community in that off-season," he said. "We're trying to do that, too. We've had some big indoor tournaments in the winter time.

Moser said eating establishments have also proven a challenge.

Yankton's limited on what type of sporting events, debate and fine arts that we can bring (in) because of what types of eating facilities we have," she said. "We don't have enough facilities that stay open late at night that will cater to buses.

Wenande said it would help archery tournaments more to see some new businesses spring up around the Easton campus itself.

"I think it would be great for any type of business to be located around the Easton Archery Center because of the number of people that are coming into the community — not just for the 2015 Youth World Championship, but for all the tournaments in general," she said. "They like being able to come to the center and walk back to their hotels and walk to get a bite to eat, which outside of Minerva's, there really isn't another option for them to eat within walking distance. I think that would be a great opportunity for someone to explore putting a restaurant out in that area.'

ing, we're starting to see some of that (addressed) We've got a new motel going up, we've got new restaurants opening. That's just one of the growing pains in a small town, but those things are happening slowly but surely.

Wenande said she also sees the situation improving in the immediate area around the archery center in the near future thanks to upcoming work on Highway 50. "Some businesses feel

they're a bit outside of Yankton if they're in that area," she said. "The typical person driving down Highway 81, if they're just traveling through Yankton, would not have the opportunity to see the business or know that it even exists out there. But there is quite a bit of traffic that travels on Highway 50. With the construction that'll be happening on 50 over the next couple of years, that should probably only increase the amount of traffic on that road. People for years have talked about how we really need to improve our east Yankton entrance, and the Highway 50 project is one of those projects that will help really do that. That might make it more attractive to locate businesses out in that area."


