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Restoration Grant Apps. Accepted

PIERRE (AP) — The South Dakota State Historical Society is accepting applications for grants to fund large-scale restoration or rehabilitation projects of historic properties.

The Deadwood Fund grant program will award amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$25,000 for projects scheduled to begin Jan. 1. Funding for the program comes from Deadwood's gaming revenue.

The grants must be matched on a dollar-for-dollar basis from nonfederal and nonstate sources.

The historic preservation office of the State Historical Society administers the program. More than \$126,000 was granted to 11 projects in 2013.

Sturgis
Rally Courts
Younger
Riders

SIOUX FALLS — As the annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally turns 74 this year, the Black Hills is bracing for as many as a half-million bikers rumbling through the region — many of them with the creaky knees, portly midriffs and graying manes that mark them out as members of the Baby Boom generation.

Organizers love their older riders, but with an eye on the future, they're making moves to attract an adrenaline-loving younger breed of riders. They're bringing in pro racers Ben and Eric Bostrom, opening up a drag racing course and staging an area of vendors and demonstrations that target the energy drink crowd.

"You've got to keep replenishing the blood to keep it going," said Tammy Bohn, who's in charge of the motor sports geared toward younger riders. "I'm bringing in the young 'uns."

The Sturgis rally drew 466,000 people last year. This year's edition, which starts Monday and runs through Sunday, is expected to do even better based on reservations and inquiries, said rally director Brenda Vasknetz. A survey of riders has suggested the event's economic impact on the state is as much as \$500 million, Sturgis city manager Daniel Ainslie said.

But the ridership is aging, Vasknetz said. Rally-goers don't have to register, but she said the average attendee is 45 to 65.

"As our demographics are aging, we are looking at new things to do to entice the younger generation," she said.

The highlight of the youth effort is several events featuring the Bostroms, known as the "Boz Bros."

On Tuesday, the brothers will invite riders on any kind of vehicle to race on the Sturgis Dragway. "From mini bikes to golf carts, the drag course is going to be open for a good time," Eric Bostrom said. "If you want to make a bet with your buddy about who can get to the end of the drag strip, that's great."

On Wednesday, the Bostroms will lead a 60-mile ride through the Black Hills.

They're also advocates for the Black Hills.

In a telephone interview, Eric Bostrom praised the peaks, valleys and curves of the Black Hills for the thrilling rides they offer. He compared the terrain favorably to Florida, where events such as the Daytona 200 can be more attractive to the younger set.

"The area, the geography, is almost purpose-built for us," he said. "It's going to be a good time. That's what a motorcyclist is all about — feeling the highway and taking those curves."

A series of events are geared at young people, concentrated at Exit 32 on Interstate 90.

Brammo electric motorcycles, where Eric Bostrom is

The site will also feature other vendors, music, food and merchandise mostly geared to young people and "hip, young bike builders that will be showcasing their latest masterpieces," according to the promotional flier.

"It's finally a place where they can park all these sport bikes and hang out," Bohn said.

Eric Bostrom said he and his brother last joined their father at Sturgis when they were kids and they look forward to working with rally organizers over the next four years to try to lure younger riders. He expects the real growth to start showing up next year as word spreads among their fans.

"I've had a huge response on social media. And a lot of people are saying, 'I wish I would have seen it sooner so I could have scheduled it.' That tells me the event is going to grow for 2015," he said.

Senators To Seek More Prison Oversight

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska lawmakers are looking at ways to increase oversight of the state's troubled prison system, including creation of an independent watchdog position or by having the department answer to the Legisla-

ture.
The Department of Correctional Services came under fire after lawmakers learned state officials failed to follow two Nebraska Supreme Court rulings that explained how to determine prison sentences.

Sen. Heath Mello of Omaha says lawmakers may create an independent inspector general to oversee the department once lawmakers convene in January.

Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha, who is leaving office because of term limits, says he's drafting legislation to create an oversight commission for the department. Ashford is calling for a special session, although Gov. Dave Heineman and many lawmakers say one isn't necessary.

Emergency Personnel Prepare For Rally

STURGIS (AP) — Emergency responders and hospitals are preparing for the increase in emergency calls that the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally has historically caused in the area.

The Rapid City Journal reports that emergency calls can quadruple during the week of the rally that begins Monday. About 450,000 will descend on Sturgis for the annual event.

Emergency responders typically get five calls a day in a regular week, but can receive 20 or more a day during the rally to treat everything from shattered bones to strokes to inebriation.

The newspaper reports that Regional Health officials limit staff vacations and add 30 more people to work each day in Rapid City during the rally.

Hospital officials expect to spend about \$100,000 per day in additional operating costs during the event.

Two Dead In Northern SD Crash

MOBRIDGE (AP) — Two people from Eagle Butte are dead following a crash at the entrance of the Grand River Casino in northern South Dakota.

Authorities on Sunday said 71-year-old Kaisagarr Tavia-Fiatoa was exiting the casino's parking lot when he turned west onto U.S. Highway 12 into the path of a Chevrolet pickup truck heading east.

Tavia-Fiatoa's vehicle came to rest in the north ditch, while the pickup entered the north ditch, went through a fence and came to rest in a pasture.

Authorities say Tavia-Fiatoa and passenger 61-year-old Alma Tavia-Fiatoa were ejected from their GMC Sierra and died at the scene. Neither was wearing a seatbelt.

Seventy-three-year-old Edward Schweitzer was driving the Chevrolet pickup. The Mobridge man suffered serious injuries and was taken to a local hospital. He was wearing a seatbelt.

Emerald Ash Borer Could Cost \$23M

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Officials in Lincoln say the emerald ash borer would cost the city \$23 million over 13 years if it starts to consume ash trees in the area.

The bug has not been confirmed in Nebraska, but some experts fear it's already in the state. *The Lincoln Journal Star* reports that it's been sighted in Lawrence, Kansas.

Lincoln Parks and Recreation Department director Lynn Johnson says the city has about 12,000 ash trees. The cost estimate is based on the projected expense of treating, removing and planting new trees, as well as buying new equipment and educating the public.

Johnson says he doesn't know how the city will address the potential problem. A bond issue is one possibility, or communities could join forces to ask the Legislature for help.

Exhibition Explores Shakespeare Plays

VERMILLION (AP) — The University of South Dakota is hosting an exhibition from the National Library of Medicine that explores several of William Shakespeare's plays.

"'And There's the Humor of it': Shakespeare and the Four Humors" analyzes how the four bodily humors once believed to define people's physical and mental health influenced Shakespeare's work.

The four humors date back to the ancient Greeks who theorized that a person's health and temperament rely on the balance of four major body fluids: blood, phlegm, black bile and yellow bile.

Ancient Greek philosophers believed that an excess of one humor would affect the individual's personality.

The traveling exhibition opens Tuesday and runs through Sept. 13 at the I.D. Weeks library building on the USD campus in Vermillion.

Theater Construction May Be Delayed

ABERDEEN (AP) — The addition of a black box theater at Northern State University may have to be delayed as the proposed construction project for the college's arts center is 20 percent over budget.

The Aberdeen American News reports that the overhaul of the Johnson Fine Arts Center is \$4.5 million over budget, which has forced officials to downsize the project.

The newspaper reports that the theater and music departments were counting on the additional space for performances.

Chef To Host Largest Spaghetti Dinner


OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — An Omaha chef will attempt to serve the world's largest spaghetti dinner in an effort to fight hunger.

The Omaha World-Herald reports that Lin Leahy hopes to serve 20,000 plates of pasta, sauce, meatballs and green beans at an event on Sept. 21. It's part of an effort to raise \$100,000 for the Food Bank of the Heartland, one \$5 plate at a time.

The fundraiser also seeks to promote a sense of small-town community in the city. Organizers say no one will leave hungry, even if they can't pay. They hope people who can afford it will give more.

The group has found food donors and reached out to local high schools. Organizers have also secured 13 serving sites throughout the Omaha area.
