Amsberry Named YAA Director

Yankton Area Arts (YAA) announced on Friday that Julie Amsberry has been hired as its new executive director, effective immediately. Amsberry was introduced Friday evening during a public reception for the Mighty Mo Photo Show exhibit at the G.A.R. Hall Gallery.

"Firstly, let me say how honored I am to be introduced at the reception for my favorite annual exhibit. I think this show exemplifies what Yankton Area Arts is about," she told those in attendance. "I am also extremely honored to be joining an organization that has done so much to promote the importance of art, not only in our community, but also in our schools."

According to board member Sarah Mannes Homstad, Amsberry's combined background in both arts education and office management made her stand out among several candidates.

Amsberry holds a degree in music education from the University of Northern Iowa and was previously a vocal instructor at Yankton High School. Recently she has served as office manager for Judi's Dance Studio and The Green Room Dance Studio. She also co-produced the short narrative film "A Requiem for Emily," which was released in 2012. The film featured several Yankton High School alumni in lead acting roles, and was filmed in Yankton.

Amsberry will begin work full-time on Aug. 12, just prior to YAA's Summer Arts Festival at Riverboat Days.

"Julie demonstrated a real understanding for the type of collaborative effort this position requires," Mannes Homstad added. "We're looking forward to her taking the reins during what we feel is an exciting time for Yankton Area Arts."

Amsberry takes over for Jackie Quinn, who resigned from the director's post in July to accept a marketing position with Mercy Ministries based out of Nashville, Tennessee.

PIERRE — At the request of the South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs, Gov. Dennis Daugaard has proclaimed Thursday, Aug. 7, as "Purple Heart Recognition Day," calling on all South Dakotans to honor those men and women who are recipients of the Purple Heart Medal.

"While we are grateful to all of those who have served our nation, the 7th of August is a day designated to remember and recognize the sacrifices endured by those members of the Armed Forces of the United States who have been awarded the Purple Heart Medal," said Larry Zimmerman, secretary of the South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs. "It is fitting to set aside a day to recognize those who have been awarded the highest honor for their service."

The governor encourages all South Dakotans to set aside time on Aug. 7 to honor our soldiers who have been honored with the Purple Heart.

"The men and women serving in our Armed Forces are tough, determined, courageous and capable of unbelievable acts of courage and sacrifice," Daugaard said.

"Our military remains as strong as it has ever been. America's veterans have been defined by the virtues of selfless service, sacrifice and devotion to duty," said Zimmerman. "These men and women, who serve and have served, are the flesh and blood of American exceptionalism."

found local notables showing off their showmanship skills in the livestock ring.

When it came to the fashion review, the entries were as varied as the 20 contestants. Some 4-Hers made a quick wardrobe change and came on stage with multiple entries. Some entrants went with formal outfits, complete with pearls, while others went for the casual look.

Laurel Freidenbach showed even bedtime can make a statement, as she wore pajama bottoms with a U.S. Army logo.

"Laurel is wearing the U.S. Army logo on the left leg because she has had relatives in the military," Hansen explained in her description of the outfit.

Nine-year-old Tori Vellek went for a look from an era long before she was born - bright colors and baggy sleeves reminiscent of the 1960s.

Showing that males also want to look good, boys participated in Saturday's fashion review. Langdon Klinkhammer, a fan of Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, wore a neon outfit that paid tribute to the cartoon. On the other hand, teenager David Freidenbach put together a shirt, undershirt and shorts that worked as either casual or work clothes.

The contestants said they entered the dress review to gain more sewing experience, to work with family members, to create a unique look and to find something for church

and special occasions.

Hansen, the announcer, said this year's fashion review drew a larger field than previous years.

"There are more 4-Hers participating in the fashion review, and there is such a wide variety," she told the Press & Dakotan.

The contestants entered categories such as sew, construction and purchased, she said. Each category emphasizes a different clothing skill.

"With the sewn category, they learn things about clothing construction," she said. "With the other categories, you learn to work with wearability, buying clothes that are a good value and what works good."

Everyone can benefit from knowing about good clothing, Hansen said.

"Even for a selected outfit (that is purchased), you learn budgeting skills, looking for sales and good buys, and what works for their body type and activities," she said.

Hansen was impressed with the 4-Hers' creative entries and the poise they showed during Saturday night's show.

"They did an amazing job," she said.

Another group of 4-Hers was drawing attention during Saturday night's program. The Yankton County Shooting Sports 4-H Club ran a table promoting their club and selling raffle tickets.

The raffle was raising money to help cover expenses for any club member qualifying for the national meet, said Shooting Sports volunteer leader Sam Hummel.

"We're the youngest shotgun club in the state of South

Dakota," Hummel said. "Our club is four years old, and we have sent a contestant to the national meet for three of the four years."

Qualifying for the national meet does carry a price. The 4-H club pays about \$300 to cover half the cost, with the member paying the other half, Hummel said.

This year, club member Ty Novak competed at the national contest in June at Grand Island, Neb. Novak competed against more than 100 contestants and finished in the top 30, Hummel said.

Hummel knows firsthand the thrill and challenge of national competition. He placed eighth in the shotgun trap shooting discipline at the 2012 National 4-H Shooting Sports Invitation in Grand Island, Neb.

Hummel was making his first trip to the national meet. He competed against 91 other participants. He was part of a South Dakota team that placed sixth.

Randy Hummel and Laddie Novak Jr., coach and advise the Yankton County club. Members are taught gun safety, shooting technique and other skills.

The Yankton County Shooting Sports 4-H Club has made a name for itself at the state level and want to take it to the next step, Sam Hummel.

"We want to qualify more members for nationals," he said.

The Shooting Sports raffle wasn't the only fund-raiser, as the Mission Hill Hillers was conducting a hog raffle.

For those looking for a sweet deal, the annual cake and cupcake auction raise money to help cover the expenses of running the Pine

Acres 4-H grounds.

Molly Larson was judged as the best overall cake, with her green cake featuring farm animals and machinery. Elizabeth and Katherine Fiedler was judged as the cake best following this year's Achievement Days' theme, "We've Got A Good Thing Growing." The theme was submitted by Abby Larson.

Other cakes used a number of themes, including the look of bacon and eggs, a fish and reel, and even a melted snowman.

After the auction, audience members moved to the livestock arena for the Celebrity Round Robin.

The spectators included Yankton resident Paul Wintz. He and his wife, Holly, have three children in 4-H: Isabelle, 10; Madeline, 8; and Olivia, 7.

The girls competed this year in fashion review and static (non-livestock) exhibits, Paul Wintz said.

"Their grandparents, John and Sally Schroeder, were really big into 4-H when they lived in Cedar County (Neb.)," he explained. "Now, John and Sally live north of Yankton and are really active in Yankton County 4-H."

Paul Wintz said he could see 4-H's positive influence on his daughters.

"They had to speak in front of the judges and talk about their outfit or project. It's a good experience for them to be able to do that. I'm glad they have these kinds of experiences."
