• Recommendations for increases in rates for water, wastewater and solid waste funds.

• Various equipment purchases, which will include a ladder truck for the fire department, a motor grader and a new

• Cost for personnel insurance under the Affordable Care • Completing road projects including Douglas Ave. to Wil-

son Rd., and Wilson Rd. to Highway 81. • Construction of a collector well at Paddlewheel Point. • Revamping the city's website with a modern interface as

"In 2004, Kathy Anderson from Chamberlain made it into the National Beef Cook-Off Finals in Dallas, which was also exciting for South Dakota. It has also been fun to see how recipes and cooking trends have changed over the years as consumer demands have changed."
