Gregory's difficulty holding his ground against the run stemmed from his struggle to maintain weight. He dropped as low as 230 pounds last season.

Now comes late June, when Yankton hosts the National Field Archery Association (NFAA) Outdoor National Championships. This event is no stranger to our community; Yankton has hosted it many times in the past. But it's still worth mentioning that the top professionals in the world — the most recognizable names & faces in this sport - all shot here.

That 5-day tournament gave way Monday to the International Field Archery Association (IFAA) World Field Championships, another 5dav event that brings archers from 17 countries. To be fair, these aren't the 'best' archers in the world, but that matters little.

It's easy to get lost in the alphabet soup that is annual archery tournaments in Yankton. but when you see Australia, England, Deutschland, India and South Africa on the back of someone's shirt, you
