in 2012, when Haggar was the lead House sponsor on a state law that lengthened the period when child sex abuse can be prosecuted.

The two other lawmakers are Rep. Peggy Gibson, D-Huron, who said her sister and her former husband were victims of sexual abuse as children, and Sen. Alan Solano, R-Rapid City, who was selected as the panel's vice chairman.

"This is really critical work we're embarking on here," Solano said. "I look forward to helping."

Soholt said the task force wouldn't be looking at who commits the crimes or how to rehabilitate the perpetrators.

Instead, she said, the focus will be on public awareness, prevention and creating opportunities for children to tell

their stories to adults including law enforcement and courts.

The first expert to address the task force was one of its members, Dr. Nancy Free, a Sioux Falls-based pediatrician who specializes in child abuse. She said child sexual abuse is any sexual activity with a child.

"Child sexual abuse is very alive in South Dakota," Free said. "It's almost impossible to find anyone on the planet who's not been impacted by child sexual abuse."

She said it's rare for children to tell what happened within proximity of the events and most often disclosure is delayed.

As adults their lives tend to be "much tougher," she said, and there is "a very strong argument" economically to address child sex abuse.

"If we don't protect our children, we will have chaos," Free said.

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Artifact ID Day Set For Ashfall Park

LINCOLN, Neb. — Ashfall Fossil Beds State Historical Park will host its 2014 "Fossil and Artifact Identification Day" from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 9 at the park near Royal, Nebraska.

Puzzled about a fossil or artifact you have discovered? University of Nebraska-Lincoln paleontologist Mike Voorhies and Rob Bozell, highway archeology program manager at the State Historical Society, will help identify items during Fossil and Artifact Identification Day. Visitors may bring a single item or a whole collec-

tion to be identified. Past discoveries include leg and teeth bones from camels, mastodons and mammoths, stone points, pottery and a petrified tree trunk weighing in at 500 pounds.

Ashfall Fossil Beds is a national natural landmark with complete skeletons left in place for viewing. The research center and active dig site allows visitors to watch as paleontologists unearth barrel-bodied rhinos and other animals entombed by ash from a supervolcano eruption 12 million years ago.

preservation in Yankton County is the exciting Mead project. ... It's a big opportunity; a big project; a big challenge — a \$4.7 million project, as I understand. And we need to make that thing become reality. That's the most important thing we can do for historic preservation in our lifetimes, probably."

Preservation board members on hand Tuesday stressed that one of the important aspects of pursuing the mill levy vote is that it shows strong local support for the project.

"As the historic folks go out to big donors or maybe apply for grants, they can show that that support is there from the county and from the taxpayers and the voters," Hunhoff said. "That's a big step."

Board members said they would help inform and educate the public about the ballot measure.

Board member Crystal Nelson said the project has already received Deadwood grants and other state funds for the project.

also — is that the (preservation) commission should come before you just like department heads and ask for their money just like anybody else does. They are a non-essential governmental service; they're not necessary to our business as a county."

He said that putting a non-profit entity on the tax roll was "a slippery slope that I don't think we want to get into."

"They're doing wonderful work," he added, "but I don't think they should be on the tax rolls."

He asked that the measure not be put on the ballot.

Commission chairman Bruce Jensen replied, "The people have a right to vote on it, whether they want it or not."

Commissioner John Harper said that this move would not amount to an "additional tax" added on to county revenue. It would still be under the general fund and "underneath the amount that we are normally allowed to levy for."

The request was tabled. Also Tuesday, the County Commission:

- heard a request from Bruce Cull and Nancy Wendan from the National Field Archery Association for \$40,000 to help in the hosting of the 2015 Youth World Archery Championships in Yankton next June. Commissioners said they were supportive of the venture, but could not make any definite financial promise until year's end when they knew how much of a surplus was on hand.
- heard an update on the placement of warning sirens in the lake area. Ten sirens are recommended, to go with two sirens that are being erected by Game, Fish and Parks in the state park. It was recommended to start with two sirens this year, and commissioners gave approval for the advertisement of bids.
- passed a motion expressing commissioners' interest in

turning Bill Baggs Road over to the city;

- received an update from Garrity about the septic tank situation at the Lakeside Trailer Park. Garrity said a meeting would be held with residents this week. The septic systems at the park were deemed too small and would have to be replaced.
- heard an update about a weed situation in the rural Irene area. Commissioners voted to contact entities that could mow the approximately 150 acres of land in question;
- heard an update from Sandy Stockholm of the Missouri Sediment Action Coalition.
- approved the hiring of a new full-time EMT.
- had a brief discussion on Dakota Plains' tentative decision to build a new grain facility in Bon Homme County.
