

in 2012, when Haggar was the lead House sponsor on a state law that lengthened the period when child sex abuse can be prosecuted.

The two other lawmakers are Rep. Peggy Gibson, D-Huron, who said her sister and her former husband were victims of sexual abuse as children, and Sen. Alan Solano, R-Rapid City, who was selected as the panel's vice chairman.

"This is really critical work we're embarking on here," Solano said. "I look forward to

Soholt said the task force wouldn't be looking at who commits the crimes or how to rehabilitate the perpetrators.

Instead, she said, the focus will be on public awareness, prevention and creating opportunities for children to tell

their stories to adults including law enforcement and

The first expert to address the task force was one of its members, Dr. Nancy Free, a Sioux Falls-based pediatrician who specializes in child abuse. She said child sexual abuse is any sexual activity with a

'Child sexual abuse is very alive in South Dakota," Free said. "It's almost impossible to find anyone on the planet who's not been impacted by child sexual abuse.

She said it's rare for children to tell what happened within proximity of the events and most often disclosure is delayed.

As adults their lives tend to be "much tougher," she said, and there is "a very strong argument" economically to address child sex abuse.

"If we don't protect our children, we will have chaos," Free said

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# **Artifact ID Day Set**

LINCOLN, Neb. — Ashfall Fossil Beds State Historical Park will host its 2014 "Fossil and Artifact Identification Day" from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Aug. 9 at the park near Royal, Ne-

Puzzled about a fossil or artifact you have discovered? paleontologist Mike Voorhies and Rob Bozell, highway archeology program manager at the State Historical Society, will help identify items during Fossil and Artifact Identification Day. Visitors may bring a single item or a whole colleccoveries include leg and teeth bones from camels. mastodons and mammoths, stone points, pottery and a petrified tree trunk weighing in at 500 pounds.

Ashfall Fossil Beds is a national natural landmark with complete skeletons left in place for viewing. The research center and active dig site allows visitors to watch as paleontologists unearth barrelbodied rhinos and other animals entombed by ash from a supervolcano eruption 12 million years ago.

oreservation in Yankton County is the exciting Mead project. ... It's a big opportunity; a big project; a big challenge — a \$4.7 million project, as I understand. And we need to make that thing become reality. That's the most important thing we can do for historic preservation in our lifetimes, probably."

Preservation board members on hand Tuesday stressed that one of the important asvote is that it shows strong

local support for the project. "As the historic folks go out to big donors or maybe apply for grants, they can show that that support is there from the county and from the taxpayers and the voters," Hunhoff said.

That's a big step. Board members said they would help inform and educate the public about the ballot

Board member Crystal Nelson the project has already received Deadwood grants and other state funds for the proj-

She added that local fundraising efforts have generated about \$2.1 million, "so we're almost halfway there." She said about 50 percent of that has been through private donations.

Most county commissioners were enthusiastic about

the measure. "I've been 100 percent for this from day 1," said Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen. "I think it's going to be valuable once it gets done. ... It's going to help the community in a lot

of different ways. However, Commissioner Garry Moore had questions about whether state law language allowed the measure to go on the ballot. He ultimately was the lone commissioner to vote against the measure

Also, not everyone in the audience was completely supportive of the move.

Resident Jay Cutts said that he agreed with "99 percent" of what the preservation board members proposed "up until we get to the mill levy.

'I've had a few calls and a few people asked me to talk to you guys again," he said. "Their feeling — and my feeling

also — is that the (preservation) commission should come before you just like department heads and ask for their money just like anybody else does. They are a non-essential governmental service; they're not necessary to our business as a county." He said that putting a non-

profit entity on the tax roll was a slippery slope that I don't think we want to get into. 'They're doing wonderful work," he added, "but I don't

think they should be on the tax

He asked that the measure not be put on the ballot.

Commission chairman Bruce Jensen replied, "The eople have a right to vote on it, whether they want it or

Commissioner John Harper said that this move would not amount to an "additional tax" added on to county revenue. It would still be under the general fund and "underneath the amount that we are normally allowed to levy for."

The commission voted 4-1 to advance the measure, but agreed to have the state's attorney review the language of the measure before it is submitted to the state by the Aug. 19 deadline.

In other business, the commission got into a lengthy and at times animated discussion concerning a request to gravel a rural road.

The request came from Doug Hevle to blade and gravel a portion of 310th St. off of 434th Ave. The road is heavily traveled and is in an area that is increasing in population. Indeed, the issue has been discussed for several years.

Most of the commissioners initially seemed open to addressing the matter, but Moore question the wisdom of taking on a road that was part of a subdivision and not technically part of the county grid.

Ultimately, Zoning Administrator Pat Garrity sided with Moore. He said the county passed a statute in 1976 not to take on more roadways, citing the growing number of subdivi sions. Both Moore and Garrity said doing 310th St. now would open "a Pandora's box" with a flurry of similar requests.

Garrity said work is currently under way on a 20-year road plan that would establish parameters and specifications for county roadways, and this could help address the issue.


