money has gotten in the way of communicating with the voters.

"I've been talking about how big money has so gotten in the way of talking to the voters versus buying your way," he said. "Big money has definitely influenced how these campaigns are run these days. I made the boast early on about visiting every town — I did that — and one of my opponents has made the boast that he was going to raise \$9 million and most of it was going to come from out of state. I think there's going to be quite a choice at the end of this campaign between someone who's actually visited all of these communities and spent the time to sit down and talk to the voters versus someone who's tried to raise all of this money from out of state who's dominating the airwaves and print media."

Weiland said one of his goals is to give people more influence.

"There's a persistence and a perseverance about making sure everyday folks in this country and in this state have a voice in Washington — not just the billionaires and the big corporations, which I be-

lieve have way too much of a voice because of the money they throw around and the lobbyists" he said.

Weiland has become so committed to the cause of freeing federal elections of big-money influences that he supports an idea of a constitutional amendment allowing congress to limit the raising and spending of money in federal elections — an idea he's seen gaining traction already.

"I've been talking about this (amendment) for 15 months," he said. "Just a couple months ago, Mark Udall from Colorado introduced an amendment, and I felt like he took the language from the back of my business card — and he's got 43 signatures in the United States Senate. I've been talking about it for over a year, so I think I've been way out in front of this issue. Big money is calling the shots in Washington. It helps write everything from healthcare policy to energy policy to financial service reform policy to what is in or not in our tax code."

Weiland said getting this money out of Congress is the best way to restore voter confidence in the legislative system.

"People want to get stuff done but they have to connect the dots," he said "The reason it isn't getting done is because

big-money special interests and their political lobbyists have got too much grip on Congress. Get the money out of politics, you'll get a better government. It'll be for, of and by us again, instead of the billionaires and big corporations."

He added a lack of willingness to compromise has also hindered the legislative branch, using the immigration situation as an example.

"We ought to be able to find some things to compromise on," he said. "The Senate got a bill passed last year — it was the immigration bill — and enough senators got together and they passed it, but it's sitting over in the House of Representatives right now and they can't get it to the floor. (Speaker) Boehner won't bring it up. I don't understand that when you've got the border crisis that we have. That bill would not only provide additional money to secure our borders, but it would also create a path to citizenship for the undocumented folks that are here. ... I'm frustrated that they can't seem to find some common ground to address those issues. Things are on hold until this election and maybe this election will change things."

Weiland said he's made it a point to reach beyond party lines and has found common concerns among people of

other affiliations.

"Every trip I'm on, I'm not just talking to Democrats," he said. "I've had over 200 town hall meetings since I started this campaign. They're public meetings and we invite the entire town, and a lot of people have showed up from the left, the right, the middle, the center, the Libertarians and it's just all over the political-philosophical spectrum. There's some common agreement. I do think people feel that our government is no longer working on our behalf."

From Yankton, Weiland will continue his campaign across the state including stops in Elk Point and Vermillion today (Thursday).

"For me, I've always felt if you want to represent the people of South Dakota, you have to get out and earn the privilege and the right to do that," he said. "The best way to do that is to sit down with them in their living rooms, their small-town cafes, their senior centers and visit with them. Have a conversation with the people you want to represent."

Wagner Woman Sentenced To 151 Months On Meth Charge

WAGNER — A Wagner woman has been sentenced to 151 months in custody on a drug charge, according to U.S. Attorney Brendan Johnson.

Brandy Angela Waetermans, 31, was convicted of conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine. Besides the 151 months in custody, she was sentenced to three years of supervised release and a \$100 special assessment to the Federal Crime Victims Fund.

She was sentenced July 28 by U.S. District Judge Karen E. Schreiber.

A federal grand jury indicted Waetermans on the drug charge Dec. 3, 2013. She pleaded guilty to the offense on April 29, 2014.
