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In eight years of covering archery in Yankton, something happened to me for the first time — that I can remember — on Thursday.

Not one, but two, people came up to me at various times to ask how and where they could “follow” the action.

I’m calling that progress.

The assumption I made on the spot was that a) these weren’t shooters, b) they weren’t someone’s relative or friend, and c) they really didn’t know where to go.

On every account, that, to me, shows that the Yankton community — in fact those two guys were from Yankton — realizes what’s been going on this week at the International Field Archery Association (IFAA) World Field Championships.

What likely happened is that these guys probably saw some of the archery coverage in the newspaper (let’s hope!) or saw some foreign archers around town. Seventeen countries are represented at

the tournament, so there’s a great chance you too have run into someone from another country.

Archery and its numerous tournaments is probably the one consistent event in Yankton that produces international visitors. The one recent example I could think of was late last year when a group of Australian basketball players visited Crofton, Nebraska, for a good will tour and an exhibition game.

Other than that, it’s no wonder that those two guys Thursday were curious to see the action.

Now, to be fair, the average spectator can’t exactly follow archers through the whole range, for safety concerns — trust me, I’ve been there, taking photos of one group while at the same time trying not to get in the way of the group shooting behind me. You can, however, see a handful of targets on the outer edges of the new NFAA ranges, particularly near the new picnic area (it’s located near the new white comfort station to the south of the NFAA headquarters).

Still, there’s something to be said for walking through those ranges back in the woods. There’s definitely a sense of adventure; like somehow you’re “roughing” it, even if only for half an hour before you walk back out into the open.

I’m not exactly trying to convince 500 people to suddenly show up at the archery tournament for today’s (Friday) final round, but I’ll leave it at this: Archery would be worth checking out in person.

#### DWU Football Picked To Finish 3rd In GPAC

LINCOLN, Neb. — After a 2013 season that saw the Dakota Wesleyan University football team win eight games for the first time since 1992 and for the third time in school history, the Tigers were picked to finish third in the Great Plains Athletic Conference preseason coaches' and media polls, it was announced Thursday.

The Tigers received 58 points in the

coaches' poll, one point higher than Concordia University at 57 points. DWU received 62 points in the media poll, which was voted on by the members of the media in attendance.

Defending GPAC champion Morning-side College was picked to finish first in both polls, receiving all eight first-place votes by the media and nine of the 10 first-place votes by the coaches, who could not vote for their own school at No. 1.

What stood out about the West River excursion?

“We saw Mount Rushmore on TV, but it’s much bigger,” Stefan said with a smile.

The family had previously traveled to France in June for the European Bowhunter Championships, and there was the fear that two extensive trips would be exhausting, Alphons said.

“I thought it might be too much in one year,” he said.

Driving across South Dakota, with its expansive space and hours between cities on Interstate 90, may have been the biggest eye-opener for the Zacharias family.

“Compared to Liechtenstein, Europe (has) less space than here,” Alphons said. “Wow, so much here.”

Geography, though in a different way, was another of the adjustments for Anja and Stefan.

Their home in Liechtenstein is mountainous, a far contrast from the flat land at the archery ranges in Yankton.

“We live in the mountains, with a lot of downhill and uphill shooting,” Anja said. “The first two days (of shooting) were hard to get used to.”

Vehicles were also among the culture shocks for the Zacharias family, Alphons added.

“They are very big,” he said. “It was a problem to park (the) car. It was quite a sight.”

As were the reactions when Anja would ask for grocery-free items at a local grocery store or restaurant, her father said.

“Gluten free, it’s not a problem over here,” he said. “People know what it means, which is helpful.”
