# Ponca's Gathering

#### 21st Annual Powwow Set For This Weekend Near Niobrara

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NIOBRARA, Neb. — As the Ponca Tribe's cultural affairs director, Gloria Hamilton expects hundreds of visitors for this weekend's 21st annual powwow.

Throughout its history, the powwow has attracted participants and spectators from different tribes and far beyond northeast Nebraska, Hamilton said.

'We have people coming from all over the place," she said. "We have them coming from California, from Arkansas and Tennessee, and from Oklahoma.'

The powwow will run today (Friday) through Sunday at the Ponca Community Grounds, located 4 1/2 miles southwest of Niobrara. Admission to all events is free, and the powwow is open to the public.

To reach the grounds, travel one mile west of Niobrara on Nebraska Highway 12. Then, turn left at the Ponca sign — located across Niobrara State Park and follow the pavement to the powwow grounds.

Grand entries will begin at 7 p.m. tonight, 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. Sunday. Meals will be provided to all in attendance an hour before each

The meals represent the Ponca Tribe's hospitality and are served to anyone on the grounds, Hamilton said. "We feed from 350 to 500 at a meal," she said.

The powwow will offer a variety of dancers, drum groups and vendors. However, the powwow also cele-

brates the tribe's culture, heritage and traditions. The 3,600-member Ponca Tribe, along with the Omaha, Santee Sioux and Winnebago, are considered the four tribes indigenous to Nebraska.

The Ponca Tribe of Nebraska was terminated in the 1960s, but its federal recognition as a sovereign tribe was restored in 1990. The tribe, headquartered in Niobrara, doesn't have a reservation. However, the tribe maintains five office sites for a 15-county service delivery area across Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota. This weekend's non-contest powwow is meant to

serve as an annual gathering and celebration of families and friends, Hamilton said.

"It's more of a sharing and gathering place for relatives and friends to meet," she said. "Some people haven't seen each other for a lot of years, and we have some who have come to every single powwow. If people are camping, we will have late hours of visiting around the campground."

While the modern-day Ponca Tribe's powwow has been held for two decades, powwows go far back in American Indian history, Hamilton said.

"What did they have back in the day? It wasn't recorded (with cameras), so we rely on oral history," she said. "Some powwows go back 100 or 120 years, but they have remained an annual gathering for meeting up with other tribes."

The Ponca Tribe's powwow follows a more traditional format, Hamilton said. The sessions open with a grand entry. Spectators can expect to witness a wide variety of dancers and drum groups.

"We have no age limits, and we have participants d spectators from all ages," she said. "We have tiny tots, some of them barely walking, on up through a lot

The dancers' dress will range from the more traditional regalia to the more colorful dancers who wear regalia such as the fancy shawl or jingle dress, Hamil-

"When we talk of traditional, it's not referring to the dance so much as the regalia they wear," she said. "The traditional men may have feathers, while the vomen may have a shawl over their arms dancers have a lot of shiny, sparkly regalia.

With the whirling motions, some dancers in bril-

liant colors and fancy shawls look similar to birds flying, Hamilton said.

One group of dancers represents a special aspect of wwows, Hamilton said.

"The grass dancers' duty at the beginning of the powwow is to stomp on the grass in the circle until it's flat," she said. "Most of the grass dancers are the
