The commission will also be deciding whether to apply for a grant of up to \$50,000 to replace playground equipment at Riverside Park. The upgrades are meant to make the playground Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant. Current equipment at the part is too out of date to order new parts for.

Other items will include planning for the Harvest Halloween Festival, approval of a new urban boundary map and consideration of new K-9 and unmarked vehicles for the police

the outpouring of prayers and support. He also expressed hope for the future.

"Jack is doing great. This is a mild setback and everyone remains optimistic for Jack, including and especially his Mom and Dad," he wrote.

As a treat for Jack, the Hoffmans went forward with plans to take their son to Kansas Ĉity to watch a National Football League pre-season game Thursday night between the host Chiefs and the Cincinnati Bengals, with former Husker running back Rex Burkhead on the Bengal roster.

Jack and Burkhead met shortly after the boy's 2011 cancer diagnosis, when Jack received his wish of visiting the University of Nebraska. Jack met Burkhead during the campus visit, and the two became close

After their initial meeting on the Nebraska campus, Burkhead not only remained in touch with Jack through phone calls and personal visits. The football player helped create national awareness of pediatric brain cancer, and the Husker football team started wearing wristbands to honor Jack.

Burkhead's support has also brought national attention to the Team Jack Foundation. The Hoffmans started the foundation to fund research for pediatric brain cancer, the leading cancer cause of death in children.

"Rex is so involved with it," Andy told the Press & Dakotan. "What began as a sick child's visit with Rex has evolved into a national movement.'

Such awareness has remained critical for the Team Jack Foundation, Andy said.

"We raised \$1 million during the first year," he said. "We are right at \$1.6 million that we have raised, and our goal is to raise \$2 million by the end of the year."

The Team Jack Foundation has begun distributing the money, seeking to find a life-saving solution as quickly as possible not only for Jack but also for all children suffering the same disease, Andy said.

The Team Jack Foundation received another major boost last April when comedians Larry

the Cable Guy — a Nebraska native who has befriended the Hoffmans — and Jeff Foxworthy performed in Lincoln. The event raised nearly \$200,000 for pediatric brain cancer research.

Such private fundraising has become a necessity for pediatric brain cancer research, Andy said. He expressed a mixture of frustration and anger at the current level of research funding for the disease.

"I'm embarrassed by the lack of funding by the federal government and private industry," he

As a result, Jack and other pediatric brain cancer patients are receiving some of the same treatments used 25 years ago, Andy said.

The striking thing about it is how little doctors know about the disease," he said. "A handful of national experts understand the disease. What makes it even more difficult, you have (many) different types of brain cancers, and not all doctors have the same level of expertise."

The Team Jack Foundation is also committed to making treatment, research and clinical trials available across the nation, Andy said. He pointed to the possibility that Jack may need to receive treatment at Boston once a week for a month, then once a month for a year.

Andy remains optimistic that trials and treatments will become more accessible in Nebraska. In the meantime, families such as his will need to travel where necessary across the na-

"We hope people don't lose sight that Jack isn't the only kid facing this kind of battle," Andy said. "We want to encourage every family battling and suffering through this disease.'

In the midst of all the turmoil, the Hoffmans say they are grateful for the one thing money can't buy — the prayers and support for Jack and other childhood cancer patients.
"When you have millions of

people praying for Jack, you can feel the prayers supporting and lifting you up," he said. "Prayers are free and we think, in the end, the prayers are a difference maker for Jack.
