This 'Zoo School' Rules!

This year, you'll be just like the big kids.

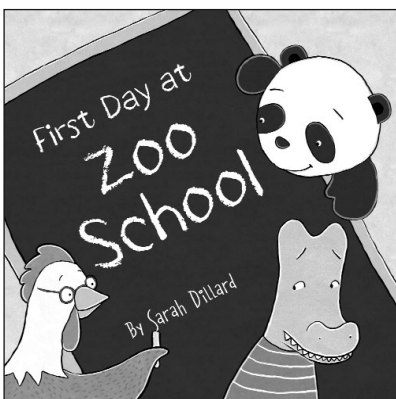
Yep, this year, you're going to school. You'll have a brand-new backpack filled with paper and crayons. You'll have a desk where you'll sit and raise your hand when you want to talk. You might even get to ride the bus.

Best of all, you'll make new friends at school, maybe even a new best friend, but be careful what you ask for. In the new book "First Day at Zoo School" by Sarah Dillard, Alfred's new BFF is B-A-D.

Mrs. Wattles had the seats lined up and her blackboard was clean. It was the first day of Zoo School, and she was eager to welcome her new students.

Amanda Panda was ready for school. She was excited because there were so many possibilities for this year. But Alfred Alligator wasn't sure. He wasn't sure if he wanted to go to school. He just didn't see the reason.

Amanda didn't see something else when she got to Zoo School on that first day: she didn't see a best friend. Every-



body else had one, so she clearly needed one, too.

Then she spotted Alfred standing all by himself.

Here was the best friend that Amanda always wanted! They could sit together, right up in front of the class. They could eat lunch together every single day and maybe even share what was in their lunch bags. They'd be a team for every game. They'd walk home together at the end of every day. It would be awesome fun!

But Alfred wasn't having any of that. He hated sitting up front in class. He tried to hide from Amanda at lunchtime, but it didn't work. She even

made him play a game that she wanted to play, even though he didn't like it.

This best friend idea was the WORST. Alfred didn't need all that, and he didn't need Amanda telling him what to do. He was NOT her best friend, and he told her so — and then he felt bad. He never meant to hurt Amanda's feelings. How could he make things better?

That first day of school is always scary — for you and for your child. But you can smooth the way with a cute little book like "First Day at Zoo School."

Every class, it seems, has at least one overeager student and author Sarah Dillard captured this one perfectly. Your child will clearly see that Amanda Panda has good intentions but Alfred Alligator isn't so sure about them, which may help children learn that they'll meet all kinds of people in school. The humor in this situation also takes some of the scare out of First-Day Jitters, and the hilarious (even to adults) illustrations will make you both giggle.

Kindergarteners-to-be and newly-minted First Graders will enjoy this tale; it may become a favorite, even later in the semester. For them, or for any child who's changing to a new school and is nervous about it, "First Day at Zoo School" will be a big hit.

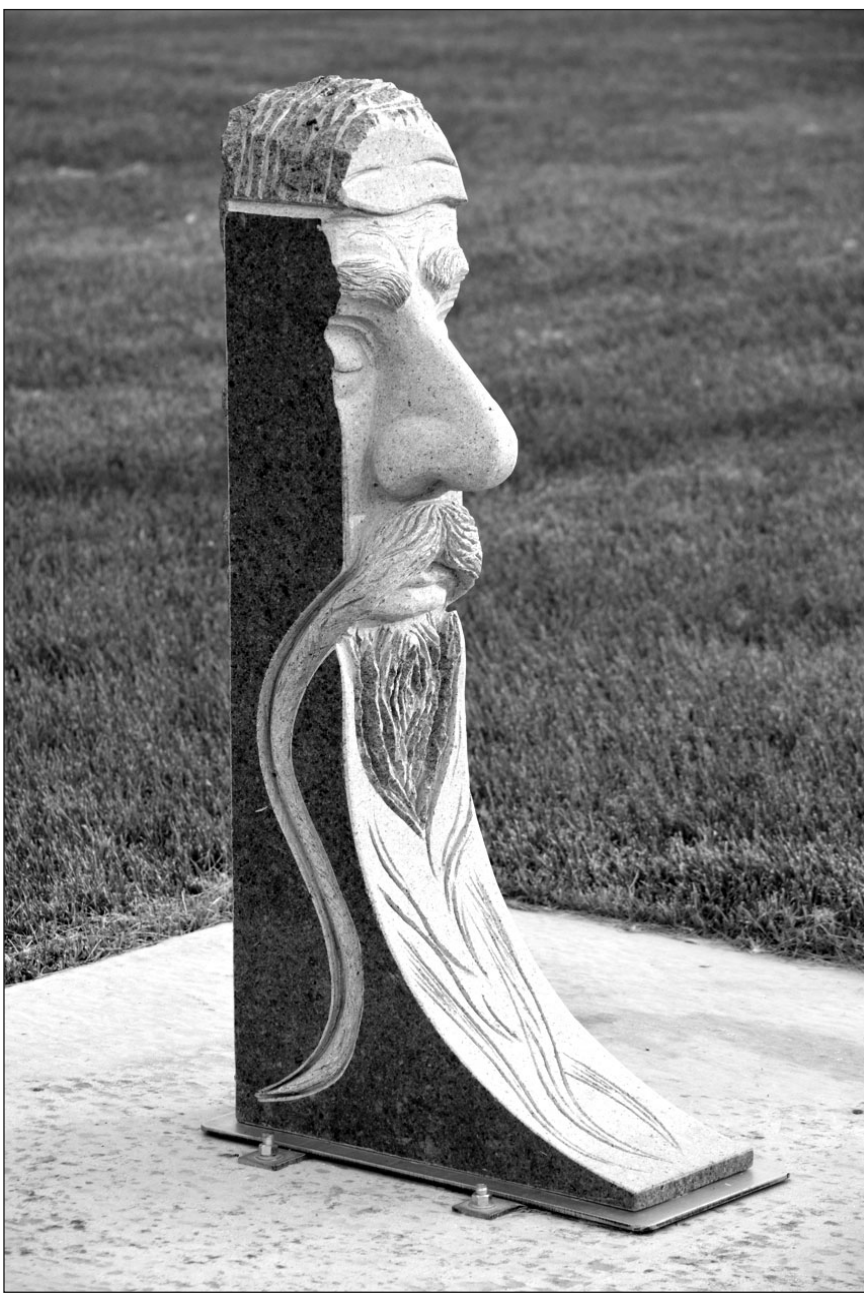

'Mountain Man'

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is part of a series of articles spotlighting this year's sculptures in the downtown Yankton RiverWalk.

Adrian E. Hanft II, Norfolk, Neb., describes his sculpture, "Mountain Man," as a "whimsical piece" that reminds him of the geological features in the Yankton area. "The red granite stone flows to form a face and drops back down the raw side to the base," he says. "This reminds me of the Missouri River flowing by Yankton. Sharp angles in my sculpture and the flowing beard contrast, much like the sharp angles and flowing of water from Gavin's Point Dam."

The sculpture weighs approximately 368 pounds, and can be purchased for \$3,750. The Lee and Suzan Gass family sponsored "Mountain Man," on display in Riverside Park at the end of Douglas Ave.

The RiverWalk sculpture project is sponsored by donations from Yankton citizens and area businesses. All sculptures are available for sale.

Janklow Portrait To Be Dedicated At USD

VERMILLION — The portrait of former South Dakota Gov. William J. "Bill" Janklow will join the portraits of nine former South Dakota governors who attended the University of South Dakota during a dedication ceremony at 5 p.m. on Aug. 27 at Farber Hall inside of Old Main.

Janklow's portrait will be added to the "Governor's Gallery," a gallery of governor portraits of the former governors who attended USD before being elected to the state's highest office. The dedication ceremony, which is open to the public, will feature remarks by Janklow's granddaughter Lind-

sey Janklow, a USD senior from Sioux Falls; Student Government Association President Tyler Tordsen, a senior from Rapid City; and William J. Janklow Public Service Scholarship recipient Samantha Zoss, a junior from Beresford. Artist Joshua Spies of Watertown, who painted the portrait of Janklow, will also be recognized. A reception will follow in room 211 of the Muenster University Center.

Born in Chicago in 1939, William J. Janklow grew up in Flandreau. He was elected governor of South Dakota in 1978, 1982, 1994 and 1998, and in

2002 he was elected to Congress. His 16 years as governor is twice as long as any other individual to hold that position in South Dakota and it spanned four decades. Janklow was 39 when voters first elected him governor and 63 when he left that office. Prior to serving as governor and as a Congressman, Janklow was elected South Dakota Attorney General in 1974. He served in the U.S. Marine Corps before graduating from USD and the USD School of Law and following graduation, he was a legal services lawyer on the Rosebud Reservation. Janklow married Flandreau na-

tive Mary Dean Thom and they raised three children together: Russell, Pam and Shonna.

Spies is an internationally-recognized and honored wildlife artist who created two portraits of Janklow that are currently on display in the South Dakota State Capitol in Pierre. He is also preparing two special paintings for the 125th anniversary of South Dakota's statehood: a side profile of George Washington's face on Mount Rushmore during the final stages of construction and a view of Lake Kampeska near Spies' home town of Watertown.

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
