Once again our professional field was incredibly strong. Some new names this year also provided a little electricity to the tournament. Andre Metzger won our event for the second time in the last three years, shooting a three-day total of 198 (18-under) and running away with a six-shot victory over Nick Delio.

Tad Leistico won the individual amateur title, shooting a 7-under 209. USD golfer Dakota Clark finished second at 218. Taylor Gusso won the individual net amateur title with a net 16-under par 200. Bill Pierce and Mike Zimmerman tied for second at net 15-under.

Golf Course Superintendent Rockie Wampol and his crew once again did an outstanding job of preparing the golf course for the event. Mother Nature interrupted with a 2-hour rain delay on Saturday, thus requiring Saturday's round to be completed Sunday morning, while simultaneously starting Sunday's round. If this is confusing, join the crowd.

Were it not for the extra effort and patience exhibited by Rockie and his staff, the confusion created by an extended rain delay would have derailed an otherwise successful event.

As well, Jim Gevens is deserving of proper recognition for his dedication to making this

event go well. When the rains came and over 100 golfers rushed in from the course Jim Gevens was there to direct traffic and get everyone safe and dry in a timely fashion. I had numerous compliments about Jim's performance, and they're well-deserved.

I also want to thank Yankton High School Golf Coach, Brett Sime, for his commitment and effort to ensure our pro-am was a success. The logistics involved in an event of this size, played over three days, and with all the various games and competitions built into the event's format are daunting and often mind-boggling, to say the least. Without Brett's experience in this area, chaos and confusion would be the order of the day. Oh yeah, his value was also amplified due to the rain delay, and he came through with flying colors.

I am also grateful for the hard work and commitment from the food & beverage staff at Fox Run Golf Course. When you're serving food and beverage for 200+ golfers per day, something ALWAYS goes wrong. And when it did, they handled it professionally and with a great deal of composure. There are too many to name, but suffice it is to say their roles are critical in making our pro-am what it is today.

Two-hundred and ten golfers hit thousands of range balls per day in an event of this size. The outside services personnel once again spent their entire days picking the driving range, cleaning the golf balls, fill-

ing the range dispenser, and then doing it all over again. Three-day pro-ams are impossible to host if you don't have hard-working outside services personnel, and we have just that.

Almost last, but definitely not least, a big thank you goes out to our many volunteers: Paula Keehr, Matthew Schaefer, Karol Kittelson, Deb Bodenstedt, Mike Groetken, and Glen Malchow. This event could not have been a success without the many hours all of you contributed.
