

## **New Coordinator Feels** Right At Home In Yankton

#### Siebrandt Gets Big Test In Handling Achievement Days

Stephanie Siebrandt spent four months working as a journalist before following her dream of working with students through 4-H.

Siebrandt started as the new 4-H/youth development coordinator for Yankton County in May. The Battle Creek, Nebraska, native said it was a natural next step for

"I got a degree in animal science and agricultural journalism from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln," Siebrandt said. "My job at the Northeast Nebraska News Company was a good experience, but I knew I didn't want to stay there forever. I was looking for something in the Yankton area that involved working with kids, so when this job opened up, I jumped at the chance.

Siebrandt was a 4-H member and also interned with the Cedar County, Nebraska, 4-H program.

"I've always loved 4-H, so this seemed like a good fit," she said. While starting in May — just three months before Achievement Days -

could have been stressful, Siebrandt quickly mapped out what she needed to do to catch up.

ment coordinator) had started, but I also wanted to bring in some new things.

Siebrandt spent the month of Mav planning and meeting with the junior leaders. In June, she went to every club's monthly meeting to start meeting 4-Hers, as well as dog and horse practices. She also helped with the Yankton public schools' summer lunch program and attended the Yankton Area Chamber of Commerce's Agriculture Committee meetings to meet the community.

My main goal right away was to get to know the kids and learn about the county," Siebrandt said.

Programs Siebrandt coordinated

this summer include a babysitting clinic, an animal science day camp, craft days, a first aid workshop, a Cloverbud camp and a rabbit program.

"It's been busy but I'm learning what they want here and trying to offer some different things," Siebrandt said. "I've

had a lot of people tell me they like what's going on, so I'm looking forward to next summer when I'll have the whole winter to plan."

With the busiest part of her job finished, Siebrandt is looking forward to

"Allowing them to develop their leadership skills, and giving them the capacity to start impacting our community with their knowledge of the agriculture industry is important, and 4-H gives

them the platform to do so." Achievement Days shines a bright spotlight on young people and their skills, providing important recognition and sense of pride, Fosheim said.

"Achievement Days in Yankton County is all about celebrating the accomplishments of these kids and their individual talents," she said. "Maybe someone doesn't excel at a sport in school but is a whiz in the kitchen. Or maybe they struggle with math in the classroom, but (they) understand exactly how to formulate a feed ration to feed their beef cattle, which helps them have a quality steer to show for the fair."

Those unique educational opportunities set 4-H apart from other settings, Fosheim

"4-H successfully allows acceptance of a child's natural talents and abilities and

interests, and it gives them a place to showcase what they excel at, in a way that no other organization can," she

And speaking of showcasing, Siebrandt gave her kudos to Tereshinski for his persistence and continued improvement in the show

ring.
"This is the third year for Matt (in the Celebrity Round Robin), and the junior leaders said he won it fair and square. He had done his homework," she said.

Tereshinski admits a bit of pride in winning the championship hardware. "They gave me a plaque for this, and we display it at the office for bragging rights," he said.




