WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stocks gained Tuesday after investors got some encouraging news about home building, inflation and corporate earnings. Investors were encouraged by a bounce in home construction last month and news that consumer prices rose at the slowest pace in five months. Home Depot and TJX, the parent company of T.J. Maxx, Marshalls and other stores, both reported strong earnings.

Currently, 4.5 percent of the U.S. power consists of renewable energy, the article states. However, a number of political and environmental factors look to shift the nation's energy supply to equal shares of fossil fuel, renewable resources and nuclear, according to the Progressive Policy Institute.

Renewable energy will become more of a factor as coal plants are retired, Minish said.

"This (wind project) will facilitate landowners and South Dakota investors to own and develop their own resource," he said.

The Lincoln County site holds particular attraction because its topography compresses wind within a smaller area, Minish said. A meteorological (MET) tower erected last April has shown the site to be a good area for wind, he added.

The efficiency of more than 40 percent — meaning the amount of time that a turbine would run at a desired speed — also ranks quite favorably compared to other projects, he said.

Minish described the levels of investment, the possible return on investment and the potential for exporting the wind energy to densely populated areas in the eastern United States.

He also spoke about the tax benefits for schools, townships and the county and the economic benefits for the region both in the short- and long-term basis.

Minish warned the audience of about a dozen people that investment in the project does carry financial risks. "It may be difficult to sell your shares, and you could lose your entire investment," he said.

In response to an audience question, Minish admitted the project has encountered some opposition.

He described most of the opponents as people with small acreages or those who object for aesthetic reasons.

"The people who object don't want to look at (the turbines)," he said.

The project doesn't pose health risks, as some opponents claim, Minish said.

"There are some places where there have been court battles, but the opponents have always lost," he said.

"There are no facts about health issues."

Steve Sershen, who works with Val-Add Service Corporation, said such projects have undertaken extensive environmental studies. He pointed to one wind site where \$250,000 as spent to measure the impact on area wildlife. Of 106 birds that were studied, only two were found to have died during their exposure to the site, he said.

Opposition is to be expected surrounding wind energy projects, especially large proposals such as the Lincoln County site, Minish said.

"There will always be someone looking to stop it," he said. "There is going to be ground that we won't go on."

However, the Lincoln County project has drawn attention — and stands to succeed — because it's initiated by local landowners, Minish said.

"It's primarily local people trying to make something better of their community," he added.
