

and lawyer Gregg Greenfield of Sioux Falls to replace them.

Sweetman is a Sioux Falls businessman and McCahren is a Vermillion lawyer.

Board member Dennis Landguth of Rapid City said he often worked with Sweetman on securing road construction materials while Landguth was at the state Department of Transportation. Sweetman is in DOT's hall of fame from the contractor side.

Landguth described him as "always fair, very professional."

Several other board members said Sweetman served as the example for how they should conduct themselves at the public meetings.

Sweetman participated Thursday with his usual blend of poise, preparation, deference and intellect. He had been chairman from November 1974 until his retirement from the board this summer.

Naturally he came prepared with some notes for his remarks.

"It really has been a great experience," Sweetman said, adding that he always tried to put the safety of South Dakota citizens first.

Pirner said the board during the Sweetman-McCahren era oversaw some giant transformations.

Waste-filled mining creeks turned into cold-water trout

streams in the Black Hills. The dust problems in Rapid City's air were brought under control. Community dumps were closed and consolidated into regional landfills. Fish kills in waters of eastern South Dakota became less frequent.

"Those were tough issues. Those were tough decisions," Pirner said. "In the end they always did the right thing."

McCahren said he "enjoyed the whole time. I didn't know it was going to last so long."

He added, "Curing some of these problems — very painful for some people and industries."

Part of the closing advice McCahren gave to the current board was to continue holding meetings in the communities where the projects seeking environmental permits are proposed.

He said it was key to public confidence.

"I wanted to go there and look at it and see the people in the restaurant and talk to them," McCahren said.

Then people don't think the board is making decisions in secret, he emphasized.

The board's new chairman is Rapid City lawyer Rex Hagg. "I don't know that we can fill those shoes, but the board will go on," Hagg told Sweetman and McCahren.

One of the board's long-time members was the late Wilbert Blumhardt of Bowdle. Son Glenn Blumhardt now serves on the board.

"Over and above the meeting time, you guys just put in time," the younger Blumhardt said.

and fiscal effects arising from the decision" during its 2015 session.

The case that led to the South Dakota challenge involved Shauna Fierro, who was arrested last August for driving a motorcycle under the influence of alcohol. Fierro had a blood test taken at the Meade County Jail. A lower court ruled to exclude blood test results in the Fierro case at the request of her attorneys — a decision influenced by the April 2013 ruling from the nation's high court. The state Supreme Court affirmed the lower court's ruling.

The trooper that arrested and drew Fierro's blood on Aug. 4, 2013, testified that at the time of the incident, he was aware of the U.S. Supreme Court's decision and had received new training as to its effect.

The South Dakota justices wrote that in cases such as Fierro's in which law enforcement is aware of new case precedent and has received training as to its effect, "subsequent activity conducted in accordance with prior, contrary, precedent cannot be said to be 'objectively reasonable.'"

"Therefore, in order to promote, meaningful deterrence of this type of law enforcement conduct, the appropriate remedy is one of suppression."

WALL ST. RECAP

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market advanced for a fourth straight day Thursday, pushing the Standard & Poor's 500 index to a record high. Investors were encouraged by news that the number of people seeking unemployment benefits remains at a multi-year low. Hewlett-Packard rose after delivering better results, while Sears plunged after reporting that its loss doubled from a year ago.
